## Planutis Voices Optimism As Cavemen Await Eagles

With less than 84 hours away, the 1967 campaign of the John Adams football Eagles will be underway. At Mishawaka Saturday night, the Eagles will face the Mishawaka Cavemen.

Head coach Jerry Planutis, heading into his seventh season, is looking to this season with optimism. With fourteen returning lettermen and a good crop of sophomores and juniors, the Eagles will definitely be in contention. "The outstanding feature of this year's club," according to Coach Planutis, "is the desire and determination of these boys."

Coach Planutis cites that Washington, Riley, and Elkhart are the "toughest teams we will face this year."

### PLAYERS' PAPP PROGRAM

When asked about the players' goal, Coach Planutis said that they have set up a "PAPP" program. "PAPP" stands for: pride, attitude, poise, and perfection.

Senior captain Dave Robinson leads the 1967 squad and lettermen who saw the most action last year. Among these fourteen lettermen, nine are seniors. The backfield looms as one of the strong points with seniors Mike McGann and Joe Waechter holding down the halfback slots. Pat Jackson will fill the fullback gap which was left by the 1966's most valuable player, Tommie Walls. Junior Rick Sayers will move up to the first-string quarterback. As targets, he will have juniors Richard Davis and Jim Smith.

Hoping that soon there will be a day when every student will want to develop his potential to the fullest, he feels, "It is tragic when a young man or woman does not choose to prepare himself adequately for a happy and successful life."

"You're out of step," or "Your squad is lost again! You did a right pinwheel instead of a right flank!"

This small spark grew as 99 band members, 15 chaperones, and 2 directors boarded the four chartered buses on Thurs. Aug. 10, and headed northward.
