



This feud started back in the season of '41 and '42, when in one game, the young Eagles clipped their opponents 22-21. Since then, the two teams have battled each other two or three times per annum with neither team boasting of a wide margin in games won.

It was during th first annual Holiday Tourney held last year that the undefeated Wildcats met a determined Adams five and suffered one of their three losses during the whole year. So you see, the foes exchange blows very hard, not in an unsportsmanly like manner, but in clean, hard fought games that a winner is hard to determine until the final blast of Mr. Reber's ever present musket.
