
AN EASTER TEST FOR YOU

ORCHESTRA AT CIVIC MUSIC

The Cincinnati Symphony orchestra triumphed in their recent concert here on March 16. Their rendition of Dvorak's "New World" symphony and Khachaturians' well known "Saber Dance", were especially brilliant.

The distinguished conductor of the orchestra, Thor Johnson, received the applause of a grateful audience for a wonderful performance. He also took time to give your Tower reporter a personal interview. He said when asked that our auditorium was as good as any in the country if we only could have a reflecting shell backstage to project the music.



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
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ADAMS BASEBALL PROSPECTS LOOK **FAVORABLE FOR '48**
