John Adams High School is now debt free. With the payment made November 30, 1948, the bonded indebtedness against John Adams was removed.

The total cost was \$739,579.00. Of this amount \$317,878.00 were grants through the P.W.A. from the federal government. The financing of the building is an example of the program initiated by Superintendent Allen some years ago known as the pay-as-you-go plan. This eliminates a tremendous overhead in interest payment and aids in maintaining a constant b o n d rate for the School City of South Bend.





PANTHERS MAUL EAGLES IN THIRD GAME OF SEASON

The John Adams Eagles lost their second game in a row on their home floor last Tuesday to Washington 55-36. The score was an indication of the game as Adams was never in the game. Washington jumped off to a 5-0 score in the first few minutes and then quickly jumped up to a 12-2 lead. Adams quickly countered with two buckets to trail 12-6, but that was the closest the Eagles could get to a red-hot Panther team that has won two straight games now. Last week they eked out a 38-34 win over New Carlisle.

Washington led at the end of the first quarter 20-7, but cooled down a little in the second period scoring only 11 points, but all Adams was able to garner was 3 points. The

score at half time was 31-10. John Adams led by the Truexs, who did not start the game because they had missed the last few days of practice, outscored Washington in the second half 26-24, but Washington had too much of a lead. Adams starting lineup consisted of Dick Bennett, Don Oakes, Jim Nevins, Joe Howell and Dick Moore. Besides the Truexs', others who saw action were Marlin Miller and Mel Edgerton.

Don Truex, although he played only the last half, led the Adams scorers with 11 points.




