



Renee Was plans to go to Vogue Beauty School for a year and then on to college to receive business training.


Phil Bender wants to go on to college.

Monica Cannon will attend Ball State University and study nursing or some other field of medicine.


Greg Ferran plans to attend Ball State for further education.





Making the product saleable when the product is you

Graduates who are entering the job market today need to hold an attitude somewhere between a conceited "Do yourself a favor and hire me" attitude and outright begging.

With positions so scarce, pleading with your prospective employer might seem to be more profitable, but students who have something unique to offer an employer can edge out other applicants.

If you took ICT, COE, DECA, or auto mechanics you may already have found a job. At least you have saleable skills. Students who took home economics may find careers in food services, fabric retailing, or interior design. At least you can fix the food if you can make enough money to buy it.

What if your high school career was marked by "nothing special?" Well, kid, either you've got problems or you get innovative.

Don't underestimate the value of your past recreational activities. No, you don't get paid to play quarters. But if you sobered up long enough to ski down the slopes or to develop good tennis style you are certainly one point ahead of the guy who wound up with mon derrier in the snow when you are applying for a retailing job in sports equipment.

Volunteer services listed on your job application may indicate that you will be a more conscientious employee than someone who participates only for the money. If it doesn't help you get a job, at least you've made someone else happy. Nursing homes, hospitals, the Red Cross, the Logan School for the Retarded rely on volunteers to improve the quality of life for many people who are less fortunate.

While babysitting or lawn work may not appear to be much experience to you, an employer will recognize that you have been in a position of trust. References from past employers, as well as teachers and coaches, should be made available to prospective employers upon request. Above all, your application should be neat - you are not typing your English paper the night before it's due.

The job interview is the process which distinguishes you from the other thirty applicants who all played in the marching band, babysat for two little monsters and a sheep dog, took five solid classes, and now want the job which should be yours alone.

To make a good impression don't wear jeans, because even if you'll be wearing them on the job, your interviewer expects you to put your best foot forward (so don't trip over it with the other foot). Don't lie, especially about your age or abilities. Have the confidence to go to your interview alone. Although a little nervousness shows that the job is important to you, don't slouch or betray nervous habits. If you smoke during your interview, your prospective employer may feel you will waste time on the job lighting up.

Maybe Aunt Matilda can return the dictionary she bought you for graduation and find you a job instead. However, it would help if you could spell...

State agency aids teens

As summer approaches, many high school students will be seeking employment. Whether your niche is gardening or construction, there is one agency here in South Bend which can help find you more than adequate employment. This agency is the Indiana State Employment Agency, located at 203 S. William St.

The Indiana State Employment Agency is Federally and State funded, and most importantly, is a free service. Looking through the employment agencies in the yellow pages, one can notice at least twenty various employment groups, yet each receivs a fee for their services. This fee is paid by you and your employer. Also these agencies

rarely deal with non-professional or part-time jobs, thus providing little help for the high school student.

The Indiana State Employment Agency is the organization which can benefit all high school students. Each year, several hundred students approach this agency seeking help in finding employment. Throughout their history, this agency has been "very, very successful." As early as March 1, the agency began it's summer work by sending information to various employers to aid them in their development of employment. Through their work, a large quantity of jobs are available, and the agency will be more than happy to help.

Finding a job can often be very tedious, but with the help of the

Indiana State Employment Agency, it can be quite simple. One merely contacts the Agency and sets up an interview. During this interview various questions are asked, mainly trying to find out your preference of work and whether an inside or outside job would be more suitable. They try to find, "a job you can be happy with." The next step is the filling out of an application. This is all it takes.
