It's Sectional time

On February 26th, the South Bend boys' basketball sectional at Notre Dame begins with Adams trying to defend their title. The stiffest competition will come from our northside enemies, the Clay Colonials, who have beaten Adams twice this season.

If Adams and Clay are to meet again, it will be in the championship game of the sectional. The two teams are in opposite brackets of the eight team sectional field. Adams cannot however, afford to look toward the finals yet. They must first win two games to get to the finals.

Adams opens the tournament against LaSalle on February 26 at 7:00. In their only previous meeting this

year in the Eagle's nest, Adams won handily 82-60.

The score, however, is deceiving because the game was close except for a couple of spurts by J.A.

Since their loss to Adams, LaSalle has steadily improved to be a great team, and they even pulled a big upset over Clay, which allowed Adams to win the NIC.

The game to follow the Adams-LaSalle clash is Riley vs. Marian. Riley is also much improved since they lost to Adams in December. Like LaSalle, they also upset Clay, but the game was at Clay. Adams has not faced Marian.

In the lower bracket and playing on February 27, Clay will face Washington followed by the St. Joe vs. Mishawaka game. Clay and St. Joe are the two dominating teams in this

bracket and should square in the semi-final.

The Adams-LaSalle winner will face the Riley-Marian victor in the first game of a doubleheader on Friday, March 1 beginning at 7:00. In the second game one week from tonight, the Clay-Washington victor will play the St. Joe-Mishawaka winner. The sectional championship game will be played on Saturday March 2 at 8:00. All games will be at the Athletic and Convocation Center (ACC) at Notre Dame.

The sectional winner will advance to the Michigan City Regional which will be two weeks from today on March 8 and 9.

Let's go out to Notre Dame and show that Adams has the best "6th man" in town.

Abortion: a relevant topic

Teenage pregnancy has become a growing problem in the United States. Around a quarter of a million infants were born to teenagers in 1984. Of course, not all young women choose to have their children, about 40% abort.

An abortion is an artificially induced termination of a pregnancy before the fetus is able to live outside the womb. In the United States 30 to 33% of all abortions are performed

on teenagers. The majority of these young women happen to be unwed.

The stages of a pregnancy are divided into three

trimesters each lasting twelve weeks. Most abortions, 51.5%, are performed in the first eight weeks, only about 39.8% chose to terminate the pregnancy between nine to

twelve weeks. After the sixth month an abortion cannot be performed because at that period of time the fetus is considered viable or able to live outside the mother's womb.

The moral issue of abortion has caused a heated controversy since it was legalized. Two factions wage a moral war against one another.

The Pro-lifers feel life begins at conception and that every unborn child has a right to life. Supporters of pro-

choice believe everyone has a different view point and that a woman has a right to make the decisions about what goes on in her body. It seems that the only answer to the controversy lies in one's beliefs and

feelings.

The Right to Life movement is pushing legislation to ban abortions. Many people feel

this would not stop abortions but that it would just raise the number done illegally in unsafe conditions. They also believe it would cause an increase in the number of unwed teenager mothers.

In the state of Indiana 3,485 abortions were performed last year on girls between the ages of 15 and 19. The choices to a pregnant teenager seem to be very few and traumatic. Yet, as in all situations in life the decision must be based on one's beliefs.

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
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
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Teenage pregnancy

The initial feeling of a teenager who is pregnant is panic. She is overwhelmed with fears and worries. What will people think? How should I tell my parents? What will the father of my child do? Should I get married?

These are only a few of the fretful thoughts that run through a teenager's mind. After the initial shock somewhat subsides, however, the teenager is bombarded with important decision making.

As the mother begins to overcome the initial panic, she is confronted with "the fear of making the decision of her life and her child's life,"

according to adoption social worker Peg Donovan. Donovan expresses four basic options that a pregnant teenager has: marriage, abortion, being a single parent, and adoption.

The father is faced with these decisions as well. "It's a side that is significant, but we often can't realize it," says social worker Bev Donati. The

father has many legal responsibilities and this is often overlooked. A pamphlet regarding these responsibilities can be found in the counselor's office.

Donovan said that there is no perfect solution for every situation. A great deal depends upon the individual's goals, family support and finance, support of the father, and maturity of the individual. A person should take these things into account when making the decisions.

Seeking professional help is greatly advised. A person who

There are many places one can go to consult with professionals. Child pregnancy agencies, welfare departments, pregnancy care centers, family doctors, priests, and ministers can be a big help to a pregnant teenager.

Seventy percent of teenagers who have babies drop out and never complete high school. As a way of dealing with this problem, the South Bend Community School Corporation has set up the School Age Mothers Program. In this program, the mother will attend school at the

is more familiar with the options of a pregnant teenager can aid in the decision making. It is often helpful to ask advice of someone outside the family who is not emotionally involved and who will not be personally affected by the outcome. This will give a more objective view of the situation.

JA ratings: CHEERS on top

With the life of the high school student filled with so many extra curricular activities (sports, jobs, etc.), it is surprising to find in a survey of John Adams students that, despite a busy schedule, many still find time to watch their favorite television shows.

Cheers, the NBC Thursday night comedy, was most often chosen as the favorite of the students polled. Set in a Boston bar, **Cheers** stars Ted Danson and Shelly Long and has been hailed as one of the best comedies ever made for television. It is consistently in the Nielson Top 20 and with the on-again off-again romance of Sam and Diane to become on-again before the season is over, the success of the show should remain the same.

Senior Tom Petersen summed up the mutual feelings about **Cheers** by saying that the cast is a group of, "characters and not just a bunch of people acting." Many of those surveyed felt the cast of **Cheers** could not be touched by the acting of such shows as **Dynasty** or **The A-Team**.

Family Ties and **The Cosby Show**, both NBC series, were

also chosen frequently by those surveyed. Ironically, both of the shows precede **Cheers** on NBC's popular Thursday night lineup, which also includes **Night Court** and another popular choice, **Hill Street Blues**.

One student felt the reason NBC's Thursday night lineup is so popular with students is that, "it's the only night of the week that has intelligent shows."

Another student felt that such shows as **Riptide** and **The A-Team** were, "total garbage," compared to NBC's Thursday night.

St. Elsewhere, another NBC series, was strongly favored in the survey. Although the hospital drama is a critical favorite, its viewing audience is less than fantastic. Adams' students, however, enjoy the show.

Other shows that fared well in the survey were ABC's **Dynasty** NBC's **Remington Steele**, and CBS' **Knots Landing**. On the other hand, some of the shows that are consistently in the Nielson Top 20 were not even mentioned by those surveyed. These shows include: CBS' **Dallas**, **Magnum, P.I.**, and **Cagney & Lacey**; NBC's **TV Bloopers**,

Knight Rider and **The Facts of Life**; and ABC's **The Fall Guy** and **The Love Boat**.

showed was that NBC is far ahead of ABC and CBS in popularity. With shows such as **Cheers** and **The Cosby**

Draft still remains a hot issue

For several years, the United States government has required that all 18 year old male citizens register for military conscription. During the time that this law has been in effect, over 98 percent of all people who are required to

register have done so. Those who do not register usually are ignorant of the laws that require them to submit themselves as human sacrifices to the nation-state, and

promptly turn in their registration forms when reminded.

If those high school students who register for the draft are actually conscripted into the armed forces by the government, they will probably be sent to Central America to kill and be killed in an undeclared war. In Central America, the United States

government supports fascists, dictators, juntas, death squads, and multinational

conglomerates in their crusade to rid the world of socialists, land reformers, nuns, and other supposedly evil liberals. The President and other moral imbeciles are aiding the right to win 'allies' with constantly increasing shipments of weapons, military advisors, and money.

Most draft age citizens, however, do not have military or economic interests in Central America, and usually lack interest entirely. They are opposed to United States

intervention in Central America, which will, if continued, lead to a wasteful, unpopular war resembling the one in Vietnam.

Despite students opposition to a war in Central America, they continue to register for the draft, walking like sheep to their local Post Offices. Why? One possible explanation is that many high school students support the United States' current right wing

administration. By registering they could be showing their support for the politicians now in office.

The most effective way that high school students and other potential draftees could take action against conscription would be by refusing to register for it. The government would be unable to prosecute large numbers of unregistered people, and the draft system would collapse.
