In 1919, Mr. Edward Rector of Chicago created one of the largest singly endowed scholarship foundations in the United States. Each year the Foundation has awarded scholarships to DePauw University to young men of outstanding ability ranking in the upper ten per cent of their graduating classes. These Scholarships pay up to $\$ 1,600$ in the four years at DePauw. This stipend is applied on the tuition in the University during four consecutive years.
