Tower Sponsors Student Poll Of Activities

On Monday, February 25, an extra-curricular activity questionnaire was distributed to the student body to acquire information for the School of Education at Indiana University and to enable Mr. Rothermel and the club sponsors to judge whether the extra-curricular program at Adams is meeting the needs of the school.

Activities were grouped according to sports, music, service clubs, publications, dramatics, and student affairs.

Students were asked to list offices held, approximate cost to maintain membership, time required to be an active member, and number of semesters of active participation.

This survey is similar to one made by the Tower in 1948. The Tower again agreed to secure this information and will tabulate and publish the results.

A.H.S. Musicians Win Superior Ratings

Adams musicians showed their colors Saturday February 23 at the state contest of the Indiana State Band, Orchestra, and Vocal Association which was held at Butler University and came home with eight of the fourteen superior ratings issued to South Bend contestants. In order to have competed at the state contest, the contestants must have previously received a superior rating at the regional contest which was held at Riley.

Carol Jones and Garry Puckett earned their first divisions with French horn solos, Jay Miller with a cornet solo, and Bob Nelson with a solo for violin.

A flute quartet consisting of Jane Gindelberger, Marilyn Burke, Dawn Witt, and Kathleen Brady was judged as being of superior rating.

The soloists receiving second division ratings were: Tom Tretheway, French horn; Bob Mortensen,

bass; Bob Nelson, piano; and Quinton Everest, piano.

A clarinet quartet composed of Bob Lent, Roger Ward, Ann Dunsmore, and Pat Lupton received a second division as did a saxophone quartet of Pat Grundy, Jerry Lupton, Dick Mortensen, and Dale Hensler. A brass sextette of which Sandra Hoelscher, Dixie Nidiffer, Bill Blue, Bob Mortensen, Don Leslie, and June Bartels were members and a clarinet trio of Bob Lent, Pat Lupton, and Ann Dunsmore also received a second division.

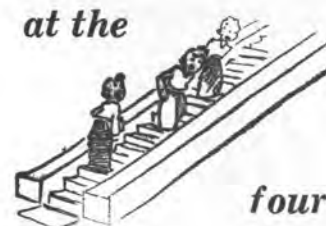

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Eagles Place Six In National Track Contest

At the close of each track season all high school track coaches in the country can enter their athletes in a national contest to determine the outstanding trackmen in the country. John Adams entered the meet last year and placed six boys in the first 100 of the nation. Of the six boys Adams placed, only two have graduated; they are Del Briggs and Paul Stewart. Ed Conrey, Ray Loar, Dick Wedel, and Dick Nidiffer will all be back this year to attempt to better their records. The totals are figured by giving a given number of points for a given height, distance, or time depending upon the event. The events are: High Jump, Broad Jump, Shot Put, 100 Yard dash and one-half mile. The performances of the Adams boys follow.

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Swimmers Grab Five Points in Conference Meet

The N.I.H.S.C. swimming meet was held here in South Bend at the Natatorium on February 16. The tourney was staged on a qualifying basis in the morning in which the first six in every event would participate in the finals in the afternoon. The only boy from Adams to qualify individually was Jerry Wiseman in the 200 yard freestyle. Our relay team, composed of Heiland, Kubo, Wiseman and Puckett also qualified for the afternoon finals.

In the afternoon, Wiseman placed sixth in his event, with a time 2:28. The first four men who placed in this all broke the old conference record of 2:18.5. The new record, set this year, is now 2:08 set by Rhoades of Hammond. Our relay team placed sixth.

The summary of scores are: Central 67, Hammond 58, Horace Mann 39, Lew Wallace 20, Whiting 17, Adams 5, Froebel 1. Riley failed to qualify a single man.
