

# JUNIOR GUIDANCE ACTIVITIES PLANNED

Panel discussions, skits, and talks by various speakers are being planned for the second semester of the year by the Junior Guidance Council. # Singer Company Announces Scholarships

The Singer Manufacturing Company, South Bend Works, announces the formation of two four-year college scholarships of two hundred and twentyfive dollars per year each. To be eligible, recipients must be sons or daughters of employees of the South Bend Works who were employed as of April 7, 1954. They must be high school graduates, having graduated in the upper third of their class in 1954 or 1955. Scholarships will be available for the school year, 1955-56 and for the succeeding three school years, providing the recipient maintains an 80 average with no deficiencies. They will be awarded for use only at an accredited four-year American college or university.

Need for financial assistance will be given consideration, as well as scholarship record and ability. Two candidates will be selected and two alternates named in order of their selection. Recipients and alternates will be notified of their selection by July 15, 1955. Scholarship chairman for John Adams is Mr. Russell Rothermel.

Application forms will be available in the principal's office and at the Singer Manufacturing Company offices by February 1, 1955. All applications must be completed and submitted to Mr. Rothermel no later than June 15, 1955. As part of his application, each applicant will be required to submit a statement, not exceeding 500 words, as to why he desires to be a recipient of this scholarship. If a recipient fails to complete any part of his four-year college program for any reason, the alternates named, if they are desirous and needy of assistance, shall be awarded the balance of the scholarship.


# Waltons Resume Work



The 1,800 fans saw little excitement in the first two games of the tourney as Mishawaka defeated Adams, 60-49, and Washington downed St. Joseph. However, Thursday night the fans were treated to a scoring spree by Adams as they blasted the Indians, 82-47. Washington and Mishawaka staged one of the most exciting games of the year with the Panthers double-overtime defeat of Mishawaka.

Adams' 82 points was high for city schools so far this season. The Indians of St. Joe never enjoyed the lead as Adams pulled away through the whole game and ended the game with a 35-point margin.

Washington led Mishawaka through the whole game, but the Cavemen managed to tie the score at 47-47 at the end of the regular game. In the first overtime, Mishawaka scored first to make it 49-47, then Hill made a beautiful lay-up to knot the score again. Both teams had two or three chances to end the game in the sudden death overtime before Jerzak took a long pass from down court and scored the winning basket with nary a Caveman near him.


