STUDEBAKER OFFERS \$500 SCHOLARSHIP

There is a scholarship available to children of Studebaker veterans of World War II. If the veteran was employed at one of the South Bend plants or offices of the Studebaker Corporation upon his entry into service, his sons and daughters are eligible for the scholarship. Bolivian English Teacher to be Adams Guest for Two Days

Adams will have a South American visitor among the students February 4 and 7. She is Miss Maria Luisa Galarza, a Bolivian high school English teacher. Miss Galarza has come from Sucre, Bolivia, and is spending five weeks in South Bend where she is learning about our School City. Miss Gwendolyn Kaczmarek and Miss Helen Law will be hostesses for our guest. Miss Galarza will observe classes during the school day, particularly the English and foreign language classes.

The United States Office of Education in cooperation with the State Department is sponsoring a nationwide exchange teacher program by which foreign instructors live in American homes and observe American families, educational systems, and government. The Indiana State Department of Instruction is working with the federal group to sponsor ten foreign teachers in our state for practical observation of classroom teaching as well as actual participation in school and civic activities.

"Welcome Stranger," a pamphlet which explains the Teacher Education Program, has this to say about what the host community can gain from the program: "... many Americans have found that their own belief in democracy has been clarified and strengthened through explaining the reasons for our traditions and customs to someone unfamiliar with our way of life."

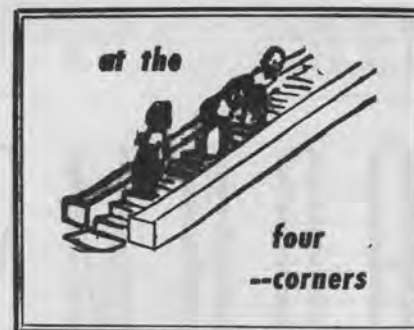

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ADAMS REGAINS WINNING WAYS - DEFEATS RILEY

Van Dusen and Waechter Pace Team in 69-61 Win

Adams put an end to their six game losing streak by tripping the Riley Widcats 69-61 in a game played January 27.

This victory gave the Eagles a 7 and 9 record overall and a 2 and 4 conference record. It also placed them in a 6th place tie with Mishawaka in the conference.

Both teams scored freely and easily in the first quarter and it ended with Riley leading 24-22. Waechter and Van Dusen were yeomen for the Eagles in this quarter scoring 17 of the 22 points.

Play slowed considerably in the second period while Adams made up their 2 point disadvantage. The score was knotted at 38 all at the end of the half.

In the third quarter, the teams traded baskets, and it ended with Adams holding a mere 2 point margin. Riley's hopes were dimmed when their tall forward, Anderson, fouled out giving the Eagles the advantage under the backboards.

The last quarter was all Adams as the Eagles pulled away until the final gun sounded with the score at 69-61.

Larry Van Dusen took high point honors along with Fred Odusch of Riley with 22 points. John Waechter hit for 17 points to take 2nd high score honors for Adams.
