

U. of Michigan Band To Present Concert

The symphonic band of the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, with William D. Revelli conducting, will appear in concert at 3:00 p.m. Sunday, February 20, in John Adams Auditorium under the auspices of the School City and the University of Michigan Club of South Bend.

The concert will offer an opportunity for students to hear an organization which Dr. Edwin Franko Goldman, conductor of the Goldman Band of New York City, maintains "stands without a peer among college bands." Credit for the band's reputation has been given to Dr. Revelli who, since taking over the conductorship in 1935, has sought to make the Michigan Band the "touchstone" for all Bands in America.

Student tickets are available at 75 cents. Proceeds will go toward sending the school orchestra to Cleveland, Ohio, in March to perform at the National Music Educators' Association Convention and to the Louis Elbel Scholarship Fund to help send a student to the University of Michigan.

Nancy MacIvor Wins Honorable Mention in Science Talent Search

Nancy Joan MacIvor, an Adams senior from home room 22, has won honorable mention in the fourteenth annual Science Talent Search. Nancy's project was to write a paper on the artificial parthenogenesis of the bull frog. She conducted several experiments and then wrote her thesis on this subject.

Three hundred and fifty boys and girls who are believed to have unusual potential scientific ability have been selected from the 1955 senior classes of the United States secondary schools and have been awarded honors in their Science Talent Search Contest.

Eight girls and thirty-two boys have won awards and have been invited to Washington, D. C. for an all-expense paid trip February 24-28. Robert E. Fassnacht, Central High School senior, has been awarded one of these trips. In addition to the forty chosen to go to Washington, D. C., two hundred and sixty students have won honorable mention.

G.M. OFFERS AWARDS

Public and private secondary school seniors are eligible for the General Motors National Scholarship, which provides 100 four-year college scholarships to any accredited institution of a successful boy or girl's choice in any field of study he may select.

There will be one scholarship for each state and fifty at large. The scholarships become valid only on the day of enrollment in college.

The financial aid will be used to pay for tuition, fees, room, and board plus other necessary expenses. The award will be at least \$200. Any amount over that will depend on the demonstrated need of the particular student. The most aid given will be \$2,000 a year.

The scholarship is continued for four years, or as long as the scholar's progress towards the requirements for a degree is satisfactory. Interruption for military service is provided for.

A student is eligible for the scholarship if he took the January 8, 1955 College Board examination or if he arranges to take the test on March 12.

Thirteen Area Schools to Play In Tournament

The thirteen high schools in St. Joseph county will participate in the annual South Bend sectional tournament next Wednesday, Thursday, and Saturday. Five games will be played on Wednesday, four on Thursday, and three on Saturday. Adams students can only purchase tickets for their own bracket and only for the Saturday games if Adams remains in competition until the 26th. Tickets are \$1.00 for the sectional finals and will be distributed in the same manner as the Wednesday and Thursday tickets were. That is, senior, junior, sophomore, and freshman season ticket holders will have preference in that order, and all those wishing to sit together should elect a treasurer to hand in their money at one time.

Tickets for Wednesday or Thursday games (depending on which day Adams plays) can be picked up at Ticket Booth A next week. All adult season ticket holders have already been sent sectional ticket application blanks.



Both teams had a hard time hitting the baskets in the first quarter and Elkhart led 8 to 6 on 8 points by their stellar forward, Dick Johnson.

From then on Elkhart continued to widen their lead to 23-18 at the half, 38-26 at the end of the third quarter, and 58-46 at the gun.

Johnson took the game's scoring honors with 26 points. He was followed by Dennis Tepe who had 14. Van Dusen and Robbins lead Adams with 10 apiece.

The B-team salvaged a victory by winning 45-42.
