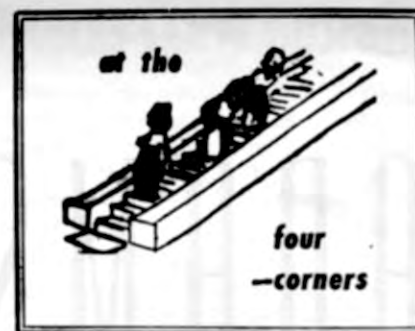
Physical Exams Scheduled for 9B's

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North Side Third Victim? EAGLES CLAW GOSHEN

Tonight at School Field our Eagles face Ft. Wayne North Side in the second conference game of the season. The men of Adams are looking for their third victory, while North Side is fresh after a convincing victory over Michigan City. (Adams first game with Riley was not a conference tilt.) Both teams are undefeated as yet this season.

EAGLES BREAK WILDCAT HEX

Two weeks ago today, Coach Murphy's Eagles showed a brilliant offense to the School Field patrons as they dealt the Riley Wildcats a 19 to 6 defeat. The Adams team finally managed to break the hex which Riley has held over them for 14 years. The Eagles used a light but fast line and an extremely fast backfield to shoot past the bigger Riley team. John Robbins played his quarterbacking position almost flawlessly. The ends, Leighty, Malcolm, and Magnuson kept Riley running down the middle, where Hylman, Conley, Szabo, Eichorst, and Rothermel awaited them.

John Robbins kicked off to start the game and Riley, not being able to do anything with the ball, punted to the Adams 27 yard line. Two plays later the Eagles fumbled and Riley recovered. Within the next few plays a Howley pass and then a lateral went for a Riley tally of 6 points.

In the second quarter Adams put together two drives; the first fell short when Robbins fumbled on the 20. Riley moved to the thirty, but a penalty set them back, and on the kick Phillips returned the ball 20 yards to the 18. Robbins then threw his only pass of the game to Malcolm for 10 yards. On the next play John carried it over and kicked the extra point.

In the third quarter an Adams fumble on the 50 gave Riley a good chance. Riley drove to the 7, where the Eagles stiffened and took over. Adams then started to retaliate with Robbins going for 14 yards and Phillips for 12, but on the 50 yard line they had to kick. The punt was fumbled by Riley and Bob Magnuson recovered on the 21. Robbins was caught back of the line by four Riley

In its opening game of the season, Adams Frosh defeated Michigan City 24 to 0. Scoring for the freshman team were Joe Jacks, Tom Townsend, and Ken Marvel. Marvel went over the opponent's goal line twice. None of the tries for the extra points was successful. The freshman team is coached by Mr. Casimer Swartz.

Displaying alertness and a good offense, Adams defeated Goshen's Redskins in their first conference game of the season. The Eagles successfully downed the Redskins 26 to 0 last Friday night at School Field.

Speed again paved the way for the Adams victory. On the fourth play of the game John Turner ran a punt from mid field to the Goshen 4 yard line. On the next play John Robbins, the Eagles speedy quarterback, dashed over the goal line to make the score 6 to 0. The Adams team was never headed. Goshen found itself running into a stone wall of defense lead by John Turner and Jerry Williams.

In the second period, it was Robbins again on a keep-it-play from one yard out. The touchdown was set up on a pass play, Robbins to Magnuson, on which defensive interference was called. Johnny's placement this time was through the up-rights giving Adams a 13 to 0 lead. Other scores were made by Barry Grady and Bud Goddard on short plunges. On the final touchdown Robbins converted to make the evening's total 26 for the Eagles and 0 for Goshen.

The Eagles rolled to a total of 226 yards for the second victory in two games.

BEAGLES DOWN CITY

The opening game of the Adams 'B' football schedule was played on the Adams field September 12 against Michigan City. The Eagles trounced the Red Devils by a score of 37 to 7.

The Eagles led 19 to 0 at half time and in the third quarter the Red Devils scored their lone touchdown when Adams had only ten men on the field.

Touchdowns for the Eagles were scored by John Turner, Bud Goddard, Tony Lacopo, Tom Kaiser, and Kenny Menzie.

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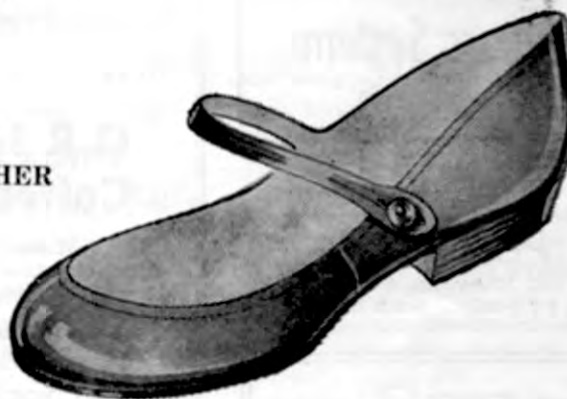
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
