

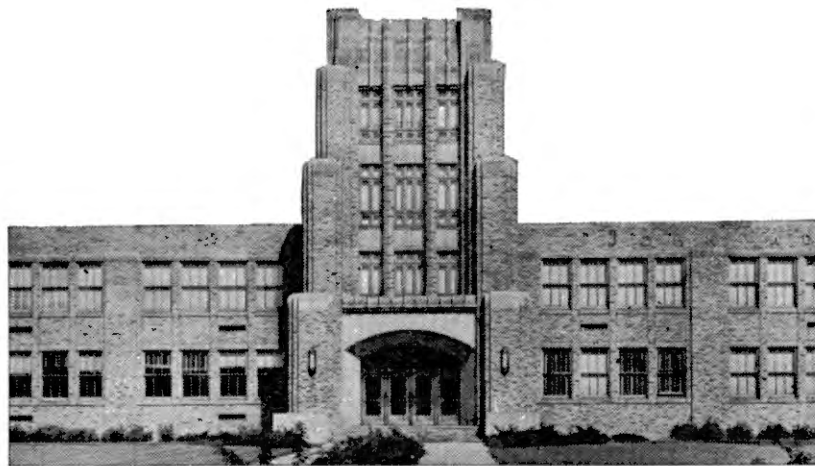

## HONOR SOCIETY AT ADAMS

The National Honor Society was organized in 1921 by the National Association of Secondary-School Principals in order to promote and recognize scholarship in the high schools of the United States. The number of the John Adams chapter is 5783. That means that there are nearly 6,000 different branches in the United States.

In order to be elected to this organization you must be in the upper third of your class scholastically. The entire faculty votes on the leadership, service, character, and scholarship qualities of each candidate. Then a special committee consisting of eight faculty members do the final screening until five per cent have been selected from the senior class. Not more than twelve seniors can be elected to the society this semester. Next semester, or each spring, five per cent of the junior class may be elected and five per cent more of the seniors may be elected. This would limit the total membership to approximately thirty-six students at John Adams.

No honor conferred by the school exceeds this honor. Election to the National Honor Society is an award from the total school rather than from one department and in recognition of a single skill.

The first meeting of the John Adams National Honor Society will be held December 14 when the Mishawaka High School chapter will conduct our installation.

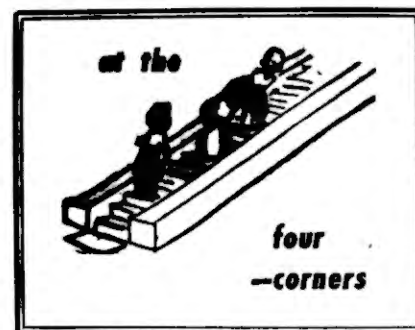

# Adams Eagles and Goshen Redskins Clash Tonight

The John Adams Eagles will meet the Goshen Redskins tonight at Goshen. The Eagles will go into the game with a record of one win and two losses. The Eagles have beaten Gary Lew Wallace and lost to Washington-Clay and Sheridan. Saturday night the Eagles will meet Terre Haute Garfield at John Adams in what should be an excellent game.

## Cagers Drop Second Game to Sheridan

The John Adams Eagles lost their second game in three starts to a methodical Sheridan team. The Sheridan boys showed a nice shooting percentage from the field and a terrific foul line average in whipping the Eagles 50 to 38. Sheridan scored 44% of its field goals and hit 20 out of 29 at the charity line.

In the first quarter the Eagles jumped off to a four to nothing lead but quickly lost it on a series of Sheridan free throws. Davis got six points in the first quarter, but also collected three personals and so had to sit out most of the game. Grady got two points and Severied collected 1 point to make the score 15 to 9 in Sheridan's favor. Sheridan hit eight straight free throws in the first quarter to account for most of their points.

In the second quarter it was all Don Severied for the Eagles but his seven points weren't enough and Sheridan lengthened their lead to 26 to 18. Sheridan hit 14 of 18 free throws in the first half and scored only four field goals.

The Eagles bounced back in the third quarter and whittled Sheridan's lead to 38 to 36. Adams had a more rounded attack with Gene Personett scoring two, Doug Eichorst scoring

three, Don Severied three, and Barry Grady six points to lead the Eagles in that quarter.

In the last quarter the Eagles met a determined Sheridan foe who could not seem to miss from the floor or charity strips. Sheridan showed a well-balanced attack in the last quarter scoring 12 points and holding the Eagles to six points. The high point man for the Eagles was Don Severied with 11 points.
