WHERE ARE THEY? In 1955 there were 233 graduates

of John Adams in January and June. Of these there are ninety-five in fouryear accredited colleges and twentythree in training less than college or part time at I.U. Extension. These four-year college students are in thirty-two different colleges across the nation. There are twenty-two at Indiana University, twenty-one at Purdue, two are on the Eastern Coast, two are in Florida and one is in California. This makes an average of 50.64% who are continuing their education beyond high school.

Sixty-one boys and girls have obtained various business positions and thirty-one boys are in industrial occupations or service. All of these except three are employed in the South Bend-Mishawaka area. The other three are scattered from Elkhart to Ohio to California, making an average of 39.49% of the 1955 graduates who have full-time employment. There are only six who are unemployed as yet.

Marriage has claimed two boys and eleven girls. Uncle Sam acquired the remaining graduates whose number totals twenty-one.

Lunchroom Employes Six Women, Twelve Students

The John Adams lunchroom, almost three years old, serves between 400 to 450 students daily. This is approximately 100 more students than last year. The staff consists of six women and twelve students.

Mrs. June Strickler is the lunchroom manager. Before she came to John Adams she was a teacher of Home Economics and was a cafeteria manager in Detroit, Michigan.

Mrs. Strickler is assisted in her management by Mrs. Wava Stone, head cook, Mrs. Hazel Wenger, in charge of pastries, Mrs. Margaret Lederer, Mrs. Hazel Brant, and Mrs. Stella Davis.

The student help consists of Gene Personnett, head cashier. Other helpers are Robert Wilson, Ed Kuzma, Mary Ann Kinsey, Lance Hanna, John Snyder, Larry Martz, Tom Tucker, Marshall Nelson, James Fenimore, LaMar Ritenour, and Art Cotherman. These students dry trays, help with the dishes, or assist in other phases of cafeteria work when they are needed.

After graduation, Sharon may go to business college, but she is sure she -Linda Flick. is going to be her dad's private secretary.


KNOW YOUR SENIORS



Being an avid sport's enthusiast, I find that I like to write sports articles more than frequently for the Central INTERLUDE of which I am Editor. Well, enough for an introduction and now to the business at hand.

I told Bob that I intended to preview the coming Indiana High School Basketball Tournament. He responded in the affirmative, reminding me however, that I was writing for the Adam's paper and not to make the article too much Central. Well, I won't.

Many games have been witnessed by the INTERLUDE Sport's Staff this year. By a process of pooling our information, we can arrive at some semblance of an idea of what to expect come the end of February and the first three Saturdays in March.

In looking at the South Bend Sectional, we find a very unusual situation prevalent. Your own Adam's Eagles characterize the situation. Though you have a rather dismal record (excluding last night's encounter with cross-town rival Riley) Coach Warren Seaborg is building for next year. This sport's prognosticator noticed last Saturday, against Columbus, a decided number of underclassmen on the squad. So next year will prove brighter for Adams. This is pretty much the case for a number of schools in this area -building for the future.

Coach Elmer McCall's Central Bears are (partiality intended) without a doubt the strongest team in this Sectional. Whether they win the laurals this year is another question. On any given night Washington's
