Literally, no man ever sees himself as others see him. No photograph or reflection ever gives us the same slant on ourselves that others see. It has often been proved on the witness stand that no two people ever see the same accident precisely the same way. We see through different eyes and from different angles. But if we could see things as other people see them, we could come closer to knowing why they do what they do and why they say what they say.

It is difficult to know the difficulties of another man's job unless we have actually worked at his kind of work. Many a person has supposed that his neighbor has a "snap" because he hasn't seen the inside problems of the other person's position.

People who have never been ill, who have never been hurt, who have never been hungry, who have never known sorrow or severe disappointment, would likely find it difficult to appreciate the point of view of people who have experienced any or all of these adversities.

It is difficult for us sometimes to explain some things because no two people, however close, have had exactly the same set of experiences or respond exactly alike to the same set of circumstances.

The closer we come to putting ourselves in other people's places, the more likely we are to understand them. And even if we can't approach a problem completely from another person's point of view, we must somehow make ourselves see that there is some reason why every man sees as he sees. And we must understand that a man isn't necessarily stupid or stark mad merely because he doesn't see what we see. If we don't learn to understand others, we may make our own lives unlivable. — **Richard L. Evans.**

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Dribblers Try Again At Auburn Tomorrow Night

The Adams basketball team which should start rounding into shape because of the nearing sectional, visits a fine Auburn outfit tomorrow. Including the Auburn game there are only three regularly scheduled games left in this so-called unsuccessful season. The basketball Eagles of last season beat this same Auburn five.

Matmen's Season Good

The Adams wrestling team completed their regularly scheduled matches for this season with victories over Hammond Noll and Crown Point and losses to Niles and South Bend Central. The team has still to participate in the conference and sectional meets.

On January 16, the Eagles met with their second defeat of the season at the hands of the Niles Vikings 41 to 13 at Niles. Dan Hoyt and Terry Conley both pinned their men while Captain Baird won points.

The matmen fared much better at home, as they racked up an impressive 34 to 13 victory over Hammond Noll on January 18. This was the second time during the season that the Eagles had defeated Hammond; the only differences in the two matches were the place and the larger margin of victory for the second match. Winners via pin route were Hoyt, Baird, Johnson, and Conley. Winners by decisions were Nicols, Scott, Hogan, and Watkins.

The Eagles took their worst beating of the year on January 24 at the hands of a rough and experienced Central team 44 to 0. Despite the score, there were some fine matches during the course of the afternoon. (Cont'd in column 4)

CAGERS COME WITHIN INCHES OF WILDCATS

The John Adams Eagles came within an inch of finally grasping their way from the cellar, but finally had to concede defeat to a Riley team also trying to get out of the sub-basement. The Eagles had managed to grasp a three point lead at the half after being down by one point at the end of the first quarter. The second half was tighter than a kettle drum with neither team getting much of a lead. It was that way right to the gun when the Wildcats walked off the floor with a 51 to 50 victory.

The Eagles could manage to put only one person in the double figure scoring column and that was Gene Phillips with eleven. Although the Eagles only had one man in the double figures, Davis got six, Marvel had seven, Edgerton added another six. Severied and Robbins each added five and Wes Rachels added a very timely six points in the last quarter.

This loss puts the Eagles in the cellar all by themselves with a record including no conference wins. The Riley Wildcats had previously occupied the cellar with the Eagles but by the slim margin of one point they managed to leave the Eagles by themselves. Big Louie Anderson was the main gun of the Wildcats getting the lion's share of the rebounds and plunking in the high point total of 17.
