BALL STATE TO HOLD SENIOR DAY APRIL 21 Annual Senior Day At Purdue March 24

Ball State Teachers College at Muncie, Indiana, is holding the Fifth Annual High School Senior Day Saturday, April 21, 1956. This conference is sponsored by Ball State in conjunction with Student Service Organizations and the Alumni Association.

The program and activities have been greatly expanded this year, and representatives from each high school in Indiana are being invited.

This is an excellent opportunity for John Adams High School students to come to the campus, visit various departments, meet students, and in general, "look it over."

Ball State offers degrees in the fields of elementary education, secondary education, business administration, nursing education, laboratory technology, and dietetics. Secretarial and pre-professional training are offered. The degrees in secondary education are in the fields of home economics, industrial arts, speech, radio, business education, music, art, physical education, English, foreign language, library science, social science, mathematics, and science. An Air Force R. O. T. C. program is also offered.

The tentative program for the day includes campus tours, departmental tours and exhibits, a panel on college life, and entertainment. Registration will be from 8:30 until 10:00 a. m., EST, and the day's program will begin at ten o'clock. The program will be concluded around 5:00 p. m. All seniors are encouraged to wear regular school clothes.

New features on the campus are the L. A. Pittenger Student Center, the new library wing, and the recently completed Practical Arts Building. The noon lunch will be served in the Student Center Cafeteria

"Erin Go Braugh" — 'Tis St. Patrick's Day Again

Sure 'n begorra, it's practically St. Patrick's Day once more! Many people celebrate the wearin' of the green on this Irish day, but few of them know the actual story of the man for whom the day was named.

Saint Patrick had a romantic life, full of adventures. He was captured by pirates from Ireland at the age of sixteen. They carried him back there, and set him to tending the flocks of a chieftain in Ulster. Six years of slavery made him a devoted Christian. He escaped to France and became a monk. In 432 a vision led him to return to Ireland as a missionary bishop. He worked zeal-cusly in various parts of the island for the rest of his life. His labors were so successful that he came to be known as one who "found Ireland all heathen and left it all Christian." Over 300 churches were founded by Saint Patrick, and more than 120,000 people were baptized.

Many legends grew up about this popular saint. One of the best-known is that he charmed the snakes of Ireland down to the seashore so that they were driven into the water and drowned.

Saint Patrick's feast day is celebrated throughout the world, wherever there are Irish people. It falls on March 17.



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

Central was the last team to bow out of it from this area, last Saturday night in the championship game at the Elkhart Regional losing to Elkhart 59 to 53.
