Dr. Evelyn Newman to **Present Lecture March 21**

On Wednesday, March 21, Dr. Evelyn Newman, a well traveled lecturer, will present a lecture on the subject "The Power of Books." Dr. Newman received both her Bachelor's and Master's degrees at the University of Chicago and her Doctor's Degree from Trinity College, University of Dublin. She was among the first American women to receive such a degree from this institution.

During the summer of 1923, she studied at Oxford University in England and spent four subsequent summers at the University of Geneva and the Geneva School of International Study in Switzerland.

During the First World War, she worked with the American Army in France and Germany through the Morale and Education Department of the Y. M. C. A. After her return to this country, Dr. Newman was appointed Dean of Women and Professor of English Literature at the State College of Education, Greeley, Colo-



From 1931 to 1939, she was Professor of English Literature at Rollins College, Winter Park, Florida. She was an exchange professor in English Literature at the University of Exeter in England during 1945 and 1946. Dr. Newman returned to Greeley, Colorado in 1939 as Chairman of the Division of Literature and Languages. She was selected as a delegate to the International Conference of University Women in Cracow, Poland in 1936 and as an official observer for the American Association of University Women at the World UNESCO meeting in Parish in 1946. In subsequent years, she has traveled and studied in Europe extensively.

In the summer of 1953, she made a studied travel tour of the Scandinavian countries and in the summer of 1954 she revisited Italy, France, and Switzerland.

Spring Sports Assembly Entertaining "Fore, On Your Mark, Set, Go, Play Ball!"

On Friday, March 9, the Adams student body and faculty was pleasantly entertained by the annual Spring Sports assembly. Wayne Benner officiated as master of ceremonies and presented exhibitions of three spring sports golf, track, and baseball. This assembly offered an opportunity to the boys of John Adams to see what is offered in spring sports and also give a better understanding of each sport to all, including the girls. The object of the various presentations and exhibitions was to promote better understanding of the sports and support of the teams.

Mr. Ernest Kaeppler, the first speaker on the program and coach of the golf team, introduced Bob Walker and Don Zombik, number 2 and 3 men on the team, respectively. Both Walker and Zombik demonstrated the use of the wood, two iron, five iron, and wedge by hitting cotton golf balls on "practice greens" on the auditorium floor. Tom Price and Dan Reynolds acted as caddies for Bob and Don. The all-time golf record at Adams is 44 wins, 81 losses, and 7 ties. In 1946 we won the LaPorte Invitational, and in 1946 we finished 7th in the State. The individual records consist of Martin Weissert's winning 8th in the State in 1951 and Paul Bumann's winning 3rd in the State in 1946.

The track coach, Mr. Vincent Laurita, spoke about the track team and introduced several exhibitions by his boys. Gene Personett demonstrated the high jump technique, Dick Nickols threw several shot puts, and Jim Sostack jumped the high hurdles. Fred Osman, Terry Conley, and Eddie Ross demonstrated the 100-yard dash in relation to Adams record, the State record, and the National record. The John Adams track record since 1943 is as follows: 1944, City Champions; 1945, State Sectional Champions; 1946, State Sectional Champions; 1948, City Champions; and 1953, City Champions. The individual records are: John Goldsberry, shot put, 50' 1034", 1944; John Goldsberry, shot put, 53' 934", 1945; John Shafer, high jump, 5' 101/8", 1946; Jerry Gibson, broad jump, 21' 10%", 1947; and Ben Jurcik, 880-yard run, 2:00.3, 1949. The above boys were all State Champions.




