



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
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Batsmen Drop 1st Game

Mishawaka managed 5 hits and 5 runs while Adams could get only 2 hits and 1 run.

With the no-hit pitching of D. J. West the Adams B-team won its opening game of the season against Mishawaka 2-0 Tuesday afternoon. The game was played on the Potawatomi diamond.

WELL BALANCED TEAM EXPECTED TO HAVE POWER

A well balanced team is expected to be Coach Laurita's key to a winning track season this year. Also by having quite a number of reliable performers the outlook for this year seems to be very bright. The team will have seven returning lettermen five of which are seniors, they are: Terry Conley, junior, 100-220, half mile relay, Fred Osmon, junior, 100-220, half mile; Bill Baird, senior, low hurdles, mile relay, broad jump; Gene Personett, senior, high jump; Pete Smith, senior, mile run; Larry Wygant, senior, low and high hurdles; and Jim Sostack, Capt., senior, low and high hurdles. The lettermen will receive very able help from the following: Gene Phillips, 100 and Ed Ross, 220; Gene and Ed will also run in the half mile relay; Bob Fischer, half mile; Jim Messick, mile run; Dave Getzinger and Ken Marvel, 440; Jerry Alford, pole vault; Roland Davis and Ben Taylor, high jump; Don Caron, John Turner, and Larry Smith, broad jump; and Jim Hylman and Dick Nichols, shot put.

The coach expects the main strength of the team to lie in the

sprints and hurdles but figures that on any given day will receive much help from any other event.

Also it is expected that at least two records will be rewritten this year. The first in the low hurdles by either Wygant or Sostack and a good sign of this is that they both have tied the record in time trials a week before the first meet. The other record is the half mile relay which is composed of four real speedsters in the persons of Terry Conley, Fred Osmon, Ed Ross, and Gene Phillips.
