



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Undefeated Eagles Meet St. Joseph Indians Tonight

Eagles Seek Fourth-Straight Victory

Our John Adams Eagles are out for their fourth-straight victory without a defeat at the expense of the St. Joseph Indians tonight when they meet at School Field. St. Joe, already beaten, will be out for their second win in the series between the two schools. St. Joe is considered a tough team and they will be out in full force to beat our Eagles. So everyone get out to School Field tonight and support the team to their fourth-straight victory.

ADAMS DOWNS FT. WAYNE 31-13

Our Adams Eagles easily defeated a very tough Fort Wayne North Side team 31-13, on September 21 on North Side's own field. This victory kept Adams Eagles in the race as one of the top teams in the state. While this game was Adams' third victory in three starts, it was North Side's first loss in three starts. Adams again continued to have one of the finest rushing attacks in the conference by gaining a total of 270 yards rushing in this game.

Gene Phillips started the string of the five Eagles touchdowns by a yard plunge which was spotlighted by a 52-yard run by Johnny Turner. Another fine run of 42 yards by Turner set up the second score which came by a pass from Barry Grady to Bob Magnuson. The kick for the extra point was unsuccessful as before.

The Redskins scored with two seconds to play in the first half. This came by a yard plunge by Nuerge of North Side. The score at the half was 12-7 with Adams leading by one touchdown.

The second half started with a bang. Gene Phillips came from nowhere to run ninety yards for the Eagles' third score of the game. Phillips, assisted by a couple of fine blocks, again made a beautiful run for the Eagles' fourth touchdown.

Our Eagles collected their fifth and last touchdown in the fourth quarter of the game by Grady's sprint of 22 yards down the left side of the field. Grady's kick for the extra point was not successful. North Side's spirits were boosted when all-state halfback Pete Lundell caught a 30-yard pass to make the final score 31-13 in Adams' favor.

ADAMS LEADS IN TICKET CONTEST

Adams is currently leading in a contest among the four city high schools to see which school sells the most season football tickets on a percentage basis according to the enrollment of each school. Adams leads with 62.8% of her enrollment having purchased season tickets, Washington is second with 55.3%, Central holds third place with 51.7%, and Riley is last with 50.7%. These are the results as of September 24.

As for the number of adult season tickets sold, Washington has sold 389 which is the greatest number sold by any school so far. Riley has sold 321, Adams is third with 232, and Central has sold 231 to rival Adams for her position in third place.

Harriers Beaten by Fort Wayne and Michigan City

The Adams cross country team was outclassed by both Michigan City and Fort Wayne North Side on September 20, by the scores of 46-19 and 46-15, respectively. In a meet of this type all three teams run together, and the points are based upon how the runners of each team finish. The winning harrier in first place was Hutmarker of Michigan City with a time of 10:6. The best the Eagles could place was Edgeir Benum in ninth place and Bob Petze in tenth place. Other harriers who placed further down the list were Tom Kaiser, Jerre Barnette, and Ward Harlen.

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Netmen Drop Matches To Goshen and Central

The Adams tennis team evened their season's record at two wins against two losses as they were defeated by Goshen 5-0 and edged by Central 3-2 last week.

Goshen, a top contender for conference laurels, shut-out the Eagles at Goshen on Tuesday, September 18. Bob Fisher, playing number one man for Adams, was beaten by Goshen's top player, King who is one of the best players in the conference. Bob Chreist and John Ross also dropped their singles matches. Goshen was also victorious in their doubles against the Eagle netmen, Bob Fischer, Gary Wallman, Bob Chreist, and John Ross to complete the match.

It took Central, also a top conference threat, two days to finally beat the Eagles on the Adams' courts. Adams was leading 2-1 at the end of the first day, September 20, when it became too dark to see the ball during the doubles matches. The Eagles' lead was built on the strength of Bob Fischer's smashing victory over Steve Kalabany, and John Ross's three set win over Greg Gates.

However, Central returned the next day and sewed up victories in both doubles matches to finally complete the match. Kalabany and Bob Carpenter took the third and deciding set from Fischer and Ross.
