Vocational Guidance Conference March 8

The South Bend Chamber of Commerce and South Bend School City are sponsoring a City-Wide Vocational Conference on science, engineering, and math. This conference will be held on March 8, at Nuner School at 6:30 to 10:00 p.m.


Students were asked to register this past week for the conference. The purpose of this program is to acquaint students in grades seven through twelve in the above fields and their related job opportunities. Parents were also invited to attend. Speakers who are successful in such fields of work will speak to the group. There will be an exhibit of engineering and scientific objects to further interest students in the accomplishments of the scientific age. The South Bend Manufacturers Division of the Chamber of Commerce will provide this part of the program.

The students will hear one session on engineering occupations and one session on science and math occupations. They will also view exhibits on these three fields.

Dress Designing Scholarship Offered

Students wishing to compete for the 1957 National Forest City Fashion Scholarship have only a week remaining to develop and submit their entries. The closing date for the 1957 competition is March 1. Senior high school students, both female and male, who are students of accredited high schools are eligible to compete. Entries require sketches of original fashions in four categories - class dress, date dress, formal evening dress, and an outfit for lounge wear. A letter of recommendation from the school principal must accompany each entry. Students competing must be in the upper third of their class.

This scholarship provides for a full tuition grant for two years' study at the noted Department of Dress Design, School of Fine Arts, at Washington University, St. Louis, Missouri. It is being offered through national competition by Forest City Manufacturing Company. The winner will be announced by May 1. I also have a pretty riotous time on the telephone. It usually goes like this:


Salesgirl: "And what was the name on that, sir?"

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CAGERS CONTINUE ON VICTORY TRAIL WITH DEFEAT OF ELKHART

Last Friday night, February 15, was certainly the highlight of the basketball season. The Adams Eagles outscored Elkhart 40-38, on the latter's home court. The situation was definitely advantageous to Elkhart. They were playing on their own court (with 7,000 fans yelling for them and their choice of referees), they were last year's state finalists, they were rated the fifth team in the state, and they have won 29 straight games on their home court.

Elkhart started fast, hitting the first four points of the game. The Blazer fans were yelling, "Pour it on, Blue pour it on!" They lengthened their lead 11-6 at the first period mark. With the tremendous rebounding of Gene Philips, Adams went the rest of the game in close quarters and on to victory. Ken Marvel picked up his fourth foul in the second quarter and was replaced by Larry Smith, who played until Marvel entered the game again in the fourth quarter. As soon as he entered, he hit a long hook shot that put Adams ahead 34-33, and the pressure was on the Blue Blazers.

Roland Davis and Wes Rachels handled the ball exceptionally well, especially when Adams nearly held the ball for the final three minutes. Lee McKnight was an added strength under the boards, in fact for both of them, as he even made one for Elkhart.

Midway through the noisy fourth quarter, Rachels stole the ball from Ken Hudkens and hit a layin; then the Blazers tied it up, and McKnight put Adams ahead on two free throws. This came before the Adams stall. The players and the points they made during this game are: Phillips, 12; McKnight, 8; Davis, 7; Rachels, 7; Marvel 4; and Smith 2.

This win put Adams in a tie for second place in the conference. The Eagles are tied with Michigan City and Elkhart with conference records of six wins and two losses.

Matmen Place Seventh

The Adams wrestling team placed seventh in the sectional wrestling meet held last Saturday at East Chicago with 30 points. Central of South Bend repeated as champion, winning their ninth championship in ten years.

Winning third place for the Eagle cause were Michael Cogdell at 106 pounds, Dick Scott at 148, Jerry Williams at 168, and heavyweight Dick Scott.

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
