Hi-Y Presents Annual Easter Assembly Today

The Adams Hi-Y Club will present its annual Easter Assembly this morning, April 19, at 8:25 a. m. in the school auditorium. This year, as in the previous years, the Glee Club, under the direction of Mrs. Lawrence T. Pate, will provide the music for the program. The program will open with the call to worship by Robert Wilson and will be followed by the hymns, "Holy, Holy, Holy," and "Eternal God," sung by the Glee Club.

Tom Horn will read the scripture of the morning after which the Glee Club will sing "God So Loved the World."

Joe Barnette will offer the prayer of the morning, and then Don Rowe will introduce the guest speaker who will be Reverend Harper S. Will. The program will be concluded with the benediction and the singing of "The Lord Bless You and Keep You" by the Glee Club.

The guest speaker, Reverend Harper S. Will, was born in the Shenandoah Valley in Virginia and graduated from Bridgewater College in Virginia. He studied for ministry at the Bethany Biblical Seminary in Chicago, where he received his bachelor of divinity degree. He studied at the Yale Divinity School in New Haven, Connecticut, where he received his doctor of divinity degree. Reverend Will has been in the ministry for the past twenty-nine years and has held pastorates in Twin Falls, Idaho; Wenatchee, Washington; and Chicago, Illinois. At the present time, he is the pastor of the First Church of the Brethren in South Bend. Reverend Will is also president of the Ministerial Association of St. Joseph County.
