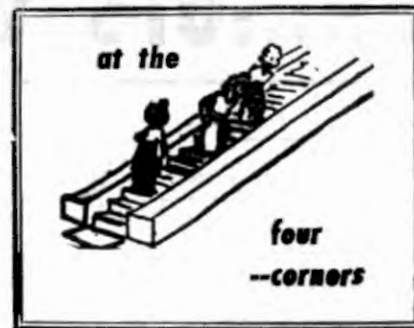

The Adams Eagles held a scoring parade last Friday evening at Mishawaka's Tupper Field. The Cavemen suffered their fourth defeat in four tries, all to South Bend schools.

The Eagles grabbed the lead on the opening play when Barry Grady returned the kick 80 yards to score. There were two very important blocks thrown on this play, one by the center, Jim Messick, and the other by guard John Bock. The extra point was missed.

After the Cavemen were forced to kick, the Eagles launched a 70-yard scoring drive which took 13 plays. The climax was a 20-yard pass combination from Ken Marvel to Denny Murphy. The conversion was again no good and Adams led 12-0.

After an exchange of kicks the Cavemen were again forced to punt, and Adams took over on the Mishawaka 45-yard line. The Eagles moved these 45 yards in seven plays for the score, with Turner going through tackle for the tally. Phillips' placement was good.

Neither team was able to move the ball until the opening minutes of the fourth quarter, when Phillips returned a punt from the Adams' 33-yard line to the Cavemen 49. John Turner then raced 37 yards three plays later for the score.

Mishawaka's lone score came after an exchange of punts, when they had moved the ball to the Adams' 20-yard line. The next play Rudy
