Out of about 300 juniors, 280 voted for officers. The voting machine was located in Mr. Roop's room, 111, and voting took place during the day of Thursday, May 8.

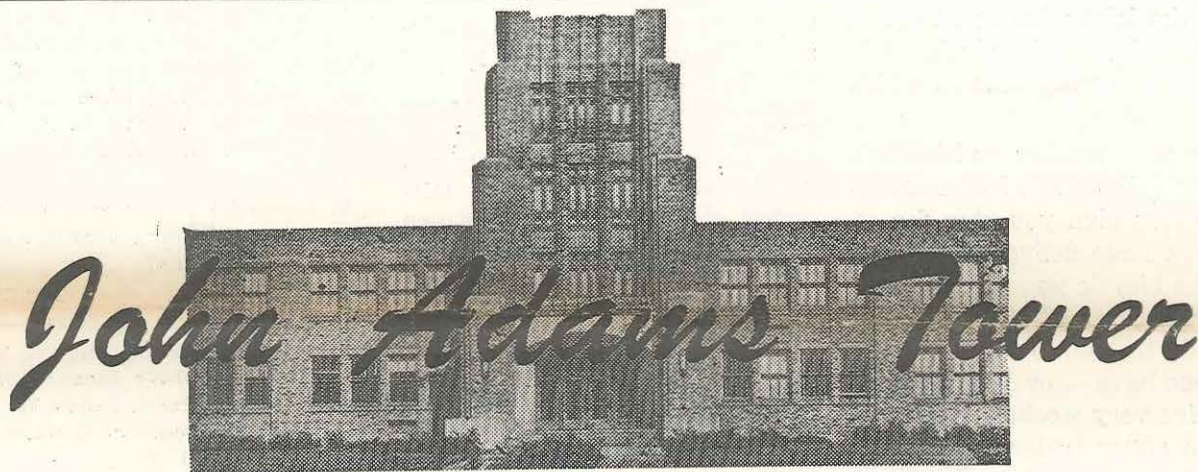

Daniel on Bowling

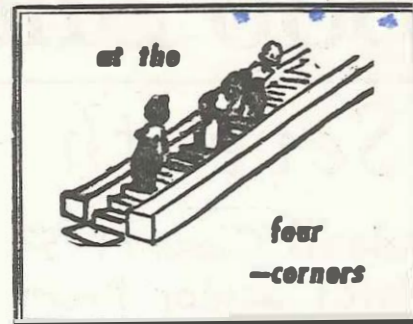

Art seems to run in Gene's family, and he attributes much of his ability to his father, who also is artistic. He has been able to help Gene with many of his art problems.

Gene has taken all of the art courses available to him and now has completed the art courses which Adams has to offer. He has also taken several adult courses at the South Bend Art Association Center.

Window Decorating

At present, Gene holds down a job at the Frances Shop, where he is assistant to the window trimmer. He has been doing the work since November and enjoys it very much. He says, "It is really good experience for me, besides being interesting. I am considering it as possible future career along with commercial art."

Gene gives credit for a great deal of his success to Mr. Robert Seeley, his art teacher at Adams since his freshman year. Mr. Seeley has criticized his work and encouraged him to send sketches to magazines. He has also helped Gene with various problems that have arisen in his work.

During his career, Gene has participated in many art exhibits and shows, most of them affiliated with his high school art work. His most recent show was at the South Bend Progress Club.

Plans Second Try

Recently, Gene entered the TB poster contest in the city and received honorable mention. His poster was then chosen to represent South Bend at Indianapolis. At Indianapolis, his poster placed among the top four in the state, but he could not receive an award because he is not a graduating senior this year. However, he plans to enter again next year and compete for a scholarship to John Herron Art School in Indianapolis.

Gene keeps all of his pictures in case he can use an idea over again, and many of his better examples are displayed in his home.

Of art in general, Gene says, "I love it and it's my life. I have never even considered another career that didn't have something to do with art."

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Wallman Throws One Hitter At Central

A seventh-inning single by Phil Acton marred a no-hit game by Gary Wallman as the Eagles defeated Central 3-1 at School Field. It was the second time in his last two complete games that Wallman has tossed a one hitter. In only one inning did the Adams southpaw fail to strike out at least two Central batters. A solid Adams defensive team played errorless ball as they raised their conference record to 4-1.

The Eagles got off on the right foot grabbing a 2-0 lead in the top of the first. Jim Fett singled and advanced to second as Denny Bishop errored Gary Wallman's grounder. Successive singles by Bob Howerton and Brad Eichorst scored the two runners. The Eagles added an insurance run in the first of the seventh on infield hits by Howerton and John Thompson, and a Central error.

Then came the dramatic last half of the seventh. Gary Wallman sailing along on a no-hitter fanned Warren to start the inning. He then hit Chudzicki with a pitched ball. Acton followed by ramming his single off Wallman's glove into cented field. Chudzicki scored as Bill Floring grounded to third.

Bob Howerton and Jim Fett lead the Eagle attack with two singles apiece. The Eagles were helped greatly by eight Central errors.

Wallman struck out 14 while walking only two and hitting one batter. Kaminski, who went all the way for Central was the loser.

'B' Team Wins One While Dropping Two

The marathon affair was finally halted after nine innings and over three hours of baseball.

The Indians grabbed a 7-0 lead in the first four innings. Adams then scored four runs in the fifth and three more in the sixth to tie the score. St. Joe again forged ahead with a run in the bottom of the sixth. Another Eagle tally in the seventh ended the scoring.

The game featured an astounding number of 21 hits, eleven by Adams.
