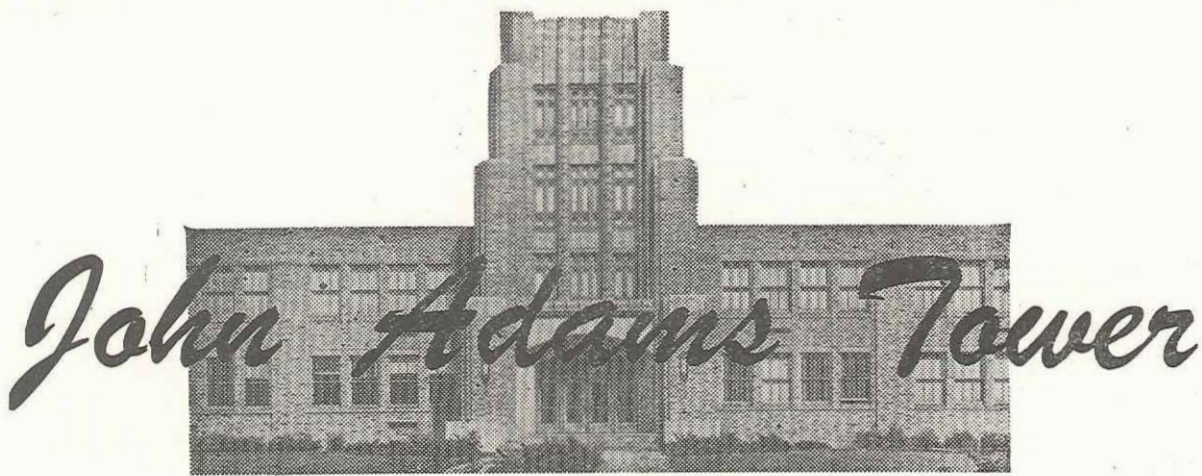

Club Concessions Now Operating

Mr. Fred Schwanz, the faculty member in charge of concession stands, has recently announced the clubs that will have booths this season. The Jr. Waltons will sell cokes in station #1 opposite the machine shop, and debate club will sell candy in station #2 which is located in the machine shop. Cokes will be sold by the band at station #3 opposite the cafeteria, while candy and sandwiches will be sold in the cafeteria by members of the TOWER and Jr. Red Cross respectively.

The Hi-Y will sell candy on the second floor, and Future Nurses will sell orange drink in the Home Ec. room. Checkroom #1 will be operated by the Y-Teens, and checkroom #2 will be handled by the Ushers Club.

Season Ticket Holders Awarded Reserved Sections

The seating arrangements for student season ticket holders is on the basis of reserved sections in the floor bleachers. The upperclassmen — grades 10, 11, and 12 — will have reserved for them the south and southwest bleachers. Those who hold the red season tickets are to enter the gym at the south entrance to the bleachers. The ninth grade and all Jr. High students will be seated in the northwest bleachers and the adjoining section of the north bleachers. Those who hold the blue season ticket are to enter the gym at the north entrance to the bleacher sections

Sale Ends Today

Since the season ticket sale to students has increased this year, it will be necessary for all students who buy tickets for a single game to sit in the balcony. This means that all student tickets purchased at the advance sale for a game and student tickets purchased at the door will be for balcony seats.

The season ticket sale ends today, December 12, the day of the Goshen game.

Young Business Men and Women Enter World of High Finance

One of the most important functions of the Junior Achievement program is the operation of a J. A. Bank. This year, the bank is named "The First Achievers' Bank" and is sponsored by the First Bank and Trust Company of South Bend. Banking services were begun in October after the granting of a charter to the company.

Officers were elected by the members of the Board at the second meeting, and Marshall Nelson was voted president. Other officers are students of Central, Mishawaka, and St. Joseph's High Schools. Adams students who are members of the bank are Holly Adams, Doris Vance, Lois Hertel, and Donna Dreesbach.

Bank Makes Investments

The bank operates on every night that J. A. companies meet. It takes deposits, cashes checks, and issues statements to the account holders. In order to earn some extra money, the bank sells candy during the "coke break." The selling of novelty banks has been taken on as a special project.

Since it is impossible for any bank to make money merely on service charges, the J. A. bank, like regular banks, invests the money that is deposited with them. Last October, the Board of Directors voted to purchase an Associates note which will mature for \$1,000. Thus, a profit is insured for the bank, which already equals more than last year's bank.

Juniors: Apply Now For Summer Program

Once again the opportunity of a lifetime is being offered to juniors in John Adams High School. This is the opportunity to visit Europe not just as a tourist, but as an integral part of the European way of life. Adams juniors may compete for the chance to live within a family just as Gail Levy did last summer in Germany, and Gayle Heyn did in France the year before.

The American Field Service has again issued an invitation to Adams to select candidates to participate in the "Americans Abroad" program. This program is in two distinct phases. One phase provides the student with the opportunity to spend a period of about ten weeks during the summer abroad. The other phase allows a student to spend not only a summer but part of a school year attending a European school. A student participating in this phase would not receive credit for the work and would have to make up one semester's credits. When making application, students are asked to indicate whether they are interested in the Summer Program or the School Program.

Two Juniors May Go

Adams is eligible for one scholarship on the Summer Program, but may have a nominee for the School Program in addition. Thus, it is possible for two students to go abroad, each in a different phase of the program.

Qualifications for applicants include being a member in good standing of the junior class; having completed two years of a foreign language by June, 1959; having attained the age of 16 years by June 1; being a U. S. citizen in excellent health; and recognizing and understanding the program.

Just Seventeen Years Ago . . .

December 7, 1941 — "Pearl Harbor Attacked!" The news set the world ablaze and the United States entered World War II. It emerged an international power, leaving behind its policy of isolationism.

Seventeen years ago — Pearl Harbor Day. We don't remember the "day of infamy," and many of us don't remember the war, but we have been touched by it. Perhaps it was through the loss of a loved one or through the changes that came over the fighting men. Yet the horrors of war are still too remote for us to imagine them coming again.

"Cold war" is the term we use today for the war of nerves we are involved in. The competition for power and arms, the diplomatic assurances that nothing is wrong: "America is on top! The U. S. is way ahead of the rest of the world!"

Complacency and self-satisfaction mark our attitude because "It will never happen to us." But we are the generation that will have to come to terms with reality. We are the Congressmen, cabinet members, policy-makers, the soldiers of tomorrow.

If we are to fill our roles competently, if we are to avoid another December 7, if we are to promote peace and understanding between peoples of the earth, we must be informed. We must keep abreast of the world situation today, and we must analyze today's mistakes to prevent tomorrow's.

Fire Drills Have More Meaning Now

The tragic fire at Our Lady of the Angels School in Chicago was a sobering event amidst the spirit and cheer of the Christmas season.

Perhaps we stopped for a moment and thought about it. Maybe we attached a new significance to our fire drills held once a month. The one we had last week, coming so soon after the Chicago tragedy, made many of us jump. Yet we take these drills so casually, talking, laughing, jokingly hoping it is no false alarm. If a fire does break out at Adams, what might happen is the opposite extreme — panic and hysteria. Speed — but not so much that students get trampled — calmness, and alertness are necessary.

Maybe the fire made us appreciate our school building a little more. Comparatively new and soundly built, the building is not as likely to go up in smoke as other schools in this area.

"Is there anything we can do about it?" we may ask. There is indeed. The families of the students who died in the school fire are for the most part of a lower economic class. They need our money for a decent burial. What else? We can prevent tragedies in our school by being on the lookout for possible danger areas and by keeping our heads in an actual fire situation.

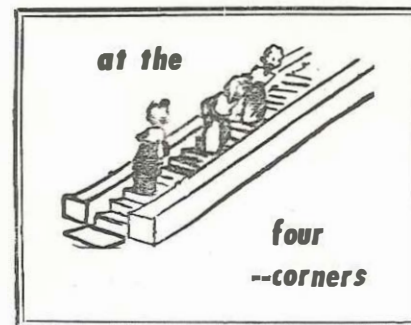
'Miss' Donselman Will Be 'Mrs.' On December 27

Undefeated Eagles Challenge Goshen

Eagles Flying High With 4 Victories

Marked improvement, particularly on defense, and a balanced scoring attack led the John Adams Eagles to a 67-48 victory over the Black Cats of Terre Haute Gerstmeyer. This was the fourth and by far most impressive triumph for the Eagles, who have yet to lose in the young season.

The Eagles flew to a 9-0 advantage before Gerstmeyer was able to put itself on the scoreboard. From here the Eagles held on to a 19-10 first period lead and a 34-19 halftime margin. With Gene Phillips dominating the backboards, Terre Haute was seldom given more than one shot at the basket. A sparkling fast break and a new guard play with Gary Wallman scoring several lay ups were responsible for most of the Adams points.

Wallman Leads Scoring

The South Benders increased their advantage to 49-33 at the end of the third stanza and to 67-48 when the game ended. Driving lay ups by the entire five and continued dominance of the boards helped the Eagles to increase their lead to at one time 21 points, and at this point Coach Seaborg cleared the bench.

Wallman led the attack with 15 points, Buddy McKnight had 14, Ken Marvel 13, and Gene Phillips 11. John Roshell led Gerstmeyer with 14 points, mostly coming from the outside as the Black Cats were unable to penetrate the Adams defense.

In addition to these specific qualifications, applicants should possess these general characteristics: adaptability, human understanding, outgoingness, scholarship, and a desire to take the responsibility demanded by the program.

Juniors who desire to apply should secure a preliminary application from Mr. Gordon Nelson in the attendance office. This preliminary application covers general information about the applicant and includes an essay by the applicant concerning his reasons for wishing to travel to Europe and what things he feels he can contribute to the family in which he will live.

Faculty Nominates

A faculty screening committee will nominate four of the applicants on the basis of this essay and send their names to the office in New York.

The approximate cost of a summer abroad is \$700.

Juniors are welcome to apply and should do so as early as possible, preferably by Friday, December 19.
