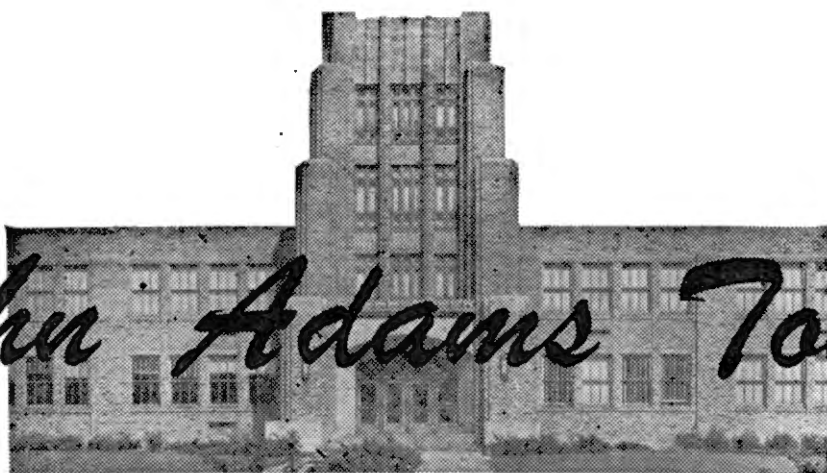

HI-Y PRESENTS 'ADAMS EVE' TONIGHT

Poster Contest Open To Students

The TB League of St. Joseph County is sponsoring a health poster contest which is open to all high school students. The general theme for the posters, "Help Fight Tuberculosis," should cause the people of our community to realize that TB still remains a threat to good health.

The posters must be 16 inches by 22 inches and all entries are to be turned in to the TB League office on or before March 9. First prize is \$30, second \$10, and third place will receive \$5. In addition to these prizes the South Bend Art Association offers a scholarship of one semester of lessons for the best poster made by a high school student other than a senior.

Posters made by senior students who will be members of the graduating class of 1959 are sent to the state contest where they compete for a \$390 scholarship to the John Heron Art School. For further information concerning this contest, one should contact the TB League, Judy Hughes, or Kent Hedman.

Juniors To Be Tested for TB

"Now this won't hurt a bit!"

This will be a familiar statement to most of the Adams juniors on Monday, March 9. T.B. shots will be given to the majority of students in grades 10A through 12B on that date. The tests will start at 8:30 a.m. and will continue during the morning.

Applications were handed out to students on February 16. Most of these were turned in with the parents' permission for the tests.

On March 12 the tests will be read in the same manner that they were given. Seniors with positive reactions will be x-rayed.

These tests are paid for in the most part by money from Christmas seals. It is interesting to note that Adams collected the most money per person for the TB seals than any other local public high school. This program is very worth while in that it allows tuberculosis to be caught by health authorities before it has a chance to spread.

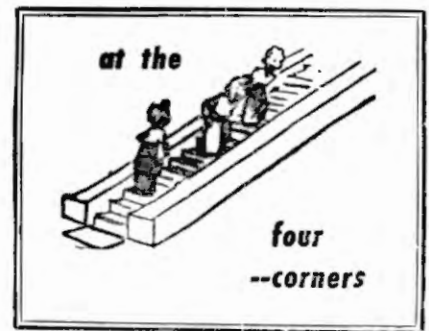

School Gives Useful Vocational Training To Mechanical-Minded

The main purpose of vocational education is to fit the individual for useful employment. Vocational education opportunities give purpose and meaning to education for students who wish to enter industrial employment after graduation from high school.

This program is not offered in place of general academic education, but grows out of it and supplements it. Vocational education on a high school level includes knowledge and training which contributes to a satisfying and useful life of employment.

AHS Offers Vocational Training

There are eight semesters of vocational training offered at Adams. These include Vocational Machine Shop I, II, III, IV, and Vocational Drawing I, II, III, IV.

The objectives of vocational education are to give the student experience in related science, mathematics, mechanical drawing, and the tool subjects related to the occupation; to help him develop specific skills and related knowledge with the occupation involved; to give the student an understanding of labor and management; to allow him to have pride in his work and an appreciation for craftsmanship; to develop individual initiative and responsibility as a worker, and to foster the development of self-reliance.

Vocational Goals

Vocational education is a problem-solving type of experience for the youth. It is a new experience which permits the youth to set up an objective and utilize facilities. Materials and personnel are made available to enable him to achieve that object. Successful experiences in this process are encouraging the individual to establish and to achieve new goals. In this sense, vocational training is good general education for those whose interests lie in this area.

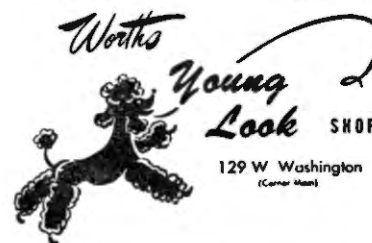

When the 1958-59 Eagles completed their campaign, they finished the greatest and yet one of the most disappointing seasons in the school's history. Never before in the history of John Adams School has its basketball team ever fashioned as nifty a record as the 17-6 mark established by the current quintet, but never before has an Eagle ball club been expected to advance as far in the State Tournament as this squad was.

Certainly this year Adams had a good ball club, a ball club to be proud of. But it seems with the wealth of natural ability and experience on the squad that they should have been harder to dump.

There are, however, many things in addition to natural ability and experience that blend together to make a great basketball squad. Among these are team effort, coaching, a rugged schedule, and solid student support.

Need New Schedule

From here it looks that if there was a lag in any of these four departments it would be in the final two, a rugged schedule and solid team support. The schedule this year was not tough enough to give a team of the caliber of this squad a run for its money in very many games. The student support started strong, but then hit a mid-season lull, before picking up at tourney time.

Good student support can help bring better teams to South Bend to play the Eagles in future years. Many powerful quintets that can fill almost any gymnasium in the state balk at the idea of coming up to play Adams before an empty house. By improving our future schedule, many Adams teams in the years to come will be given a better opportunity to improve themselves throughout the season than this team was given.

But long after the State Champion has been crowned let us not forget that the 1958-59 basketball team, although it did not win a Sectional Tournament Title, had the greatest record in John Adams basketball history.

Defending Champs Bow To Central

The John Adams Eagles ended their 1958-1959 basketball campaign, as 709 quinters in Indiana did, on a losing note, falling to the Central Bears 54-45 in semi-final action of the Mishawaka Sectional. The fine outside shooting of Bill Molnar and Rudy Anderson offset the outstanding defensive job by Gene Phillips on Sylvester Coalmon.

Phillips, Neil Bradley, and Buddy McKnight battled the Central trio of Coalmon, Gil Walker, and Joe Wesley almost even off the backboards, but McKnight's 15 points couldn't match the 18 by Anderson and 14 by Molnar from the outside.

Adams jumped off to a 6-2 lead, but the Bears quickly found themselves and stormed back to grab a 10-6 advantage. From here on in the Bears were never headed, leading 12-10 at the end of the first period, 22-16 at halftime and 38-29 at the third stop.

Eagles Closed Gap

Time and time again the Eagles would fight back into striking distance during the second half only to have the popping of Anderson and Molnar slam the door of opportunity in their face. Late in the third stanza the Bears stretched their margin to 34-25. But a pair of charity tosses by McKnight and a bucket by Ken Marvel closed the gap to 34-29, and it looked like the Eagles might come back. However, free throws by Coalmon and field goals by Anderson and Molnar moved the count back up to 40-29.
