# Honor Society To Hold Fall Induction

The fall induction of the John Adams High School National Honor Society will be held on Tuesday, November 3. At that time, fifteen individuals or five percent of the senior class will be inducted. Only those students who rank in the upper onethird of the senior class are eligible.

The members of the faculty vote for those eligible students on the basis of their leadership, character, and service qualities. A point system is used. Five points is the highest number anyone may receive in a particular area. Four points denotes superiority; three is good; two, average; and one, below average.

Mr. Thomas Keiser, the faculty advisor of the National Honor Society, tabulates these scores. He does not make final selections.

Top Forty Submitted to Faculty

The names of the top forty students derived from this tabulation will be submitted to the high school faculty committee. These faculty members make all final screenings. It is through these various steps that the fifteen inductees will be chosen.

Juniors and seniors only, will be attending the solemn candlelight ceremony. Following the induction. a tea for the new members and their parents will be held in the cafeteria.

Those members of the Class of '61 who meet the stated qualifications will be eligible for induction in the spring.

For the past several weeks, the American Government classes of Mr. Robert Rensberger and Mr. Donald Truex have met and functioned as does the Congress of the United States.

Bills have been introduced pertaining to matters within Adams, South Bend, and the United States. These hills were sent to various committees and sub-committees in the House and Senate depending upon the nature of the bills and where they were introduced.

When a bill is passed in the government classes and considered of practical importance, it is taken to the "President," Mr. Rothermel, to be approved and acted upon. If he vetoes a bill, the classes do not override the veto.



# Goshen To Visit Eagles This Evening

# **Blazers Hand Eagles** Third Loss of Year

Last Wednesday night saw the Adam's eleven bow to the Elkhart Blazers, 20-0.

The Eagles held the Blazer's attack during the first stanza with needed help from several key fumbles by Blazer backs, but after the scoreless quarter, the Elkhart attack began to roll and was never really stopped for rest of the night.

Elkhart's first touchdown came midway through the second period on a 34-yard pass-and-run play, climaxing a 90-yard march. The conversion was good and Elkhart led 7-0.

Again in the second quarter with three minutes remaining, Moyese Williams, the left halfback for Elkhart plunged four yards for the sec-ond score at the end of a 58-yard drive.

With seconds remaining in the first half, quarterback Mickey Stricklen shoveled a screen pass to fullback Dave Stout who carried the ball down to the Blazer 14, only to have time run out before a scoring play could be attempted.

The Eagles started the initial drive in the second half only to lose the ball on a funmble at mid-field. After marching to the Adams two in five plays, fullback Larry Gall plunged the final two yards for Elkhart's third score.

With less than two minutes remaining Bob Smith intercepted a pass and took it to the Blazer 17-yard line. The Eagles went down to the two only to fumble away their last chance.

Since this was a non-conference game, the Adams conference record still stands at 3-1 with its overall record, 4-3.

### **Freshmen Fall At** Hands of Goshen Frosh

The Adams freshmen footballers, under the coaching of "Cas" Swartz and "Mo" Aronson, traveled to Goshen on Wednesday, October 21, and were handed their fifth loss in six attempts, as they were blanked by a 6-0 count.

Goshen pushed across its lone score in the initial stanza. This proved to be the margin of victory, as neither team was able to dent the scoring column from that point on.



### Thinlies Take Part In Annual Events

During the past two weeks the Eagle cross country team participated in three annual meets.

At the City Meet held on October 13, the Eagle runners finished fourth behind Riley, Washington, and Central in that order.

On October 16, at the Conference Meet at LaPorte the Adams squad placed 15th out of the 22 participating teams.

The thinlies came in ninth at the Sectional Meet at Erskine on October 20.

### LaPorte, Riley Hand **Defeats to Beagles**

The Beagles, after losing to LaPorte and Riley in their last two encounters, possess a season's record of 2 wins and 6 losses.

The Beagles fell to the LaPorte "B" team by a 19-6 score on the Adams practice field on October 19.

On October 26, the Beagles traveled across town only to lose to their cityrival the Riley Bees 2-0. The Riley score came on a safety in the waning moments of the third quarter.

### ADAMS WHIPS RILEY FOR FOURTH WIN

On October 17, the Adams Eagles gained their fourth victory of the season by outlasting Riley's winless Wildcats 7-6 at School Field Stadium.

The Eagles scored in the opening moments of play with a sustained march after receiving the opening kick off. Dave Stout went over from six yards out and Lonnie Glassburn added the extra-point to give the Eagles a 7-0 lead.

The lead stood pat until midway in the fourth period when Riley quarterback Bob Foor tossed a scoring pass to end Rodney Sipe. However, Foor's conversion attempt missed and the Eagles clung to a 7-6 win.

Elkhart's Blazers last Wednesday night, the question of the effect that the scheduling of week night games has on the players comes up. A football team usually has five, six, or seven days to rest between games. However, twice this season the Eagles have played on a number of rest days vastly different from the usual. Both times the Eagles were defeated. Against Washington the Eagles played on ten days of rest and aginst Elkhart they played on only three days rest. . . . Whether this had any bearing on the outcome of the games cannot be said. . .

Early Wynn the 22-game winner of the Chicago White Sox is the best example of the effect that rest has on an athlete. In 1958 Manager Al Lopez started Wynn every fifth day and the big righthander won only fourteen games, but this season Lopez gave Wynn a start every four days and he responded with 22 victories. The extra day of rest caused Wynn to be stale on the mound and not exhibit his best stuff.

**Gridders to Face Once-Beaten** 'Skins In ENIHSC Game

The Goshen Redskins of Coach Don Yoder, one of the finest prep football teams in the state of Indiana, will invade School Field Stadium tonight to do battle with the John Adams Eagles of Coach Bob Scannell. The Redskins fresh from a 33-0 shellacking of Fort Wayne South Side boast an overall season's record of six wins against a single setback, while the Eagles own a four win, three loss mark.

The game looms as a crucial battle for second spot in the ENIHSC as both elevens are currently tied for the spot with identical league slates of three wins and one defeat. Elkhart, Michigan City and LaPorte are also tied for second place.

The Redskins are led by an experienced backfield unit headed by All-Conference quarterback Jim Yoder, son of the coach. A southpaw thrower, Yoder is probably the most dangerous long passer in the loop. Joining Yoder in the backfield are speedy halfbacks Bud Smith and Bill Johnson, and blockbusting fullback Dan Berkey.

The Beagles under Coach Joe Laiber conclude their season on Monday afternoon when they tangle with the Washington Bees on the Adams practice field.

The tennis, cross-country, and frosh football teams have all ended their 1959 campaigns.



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
