Thirteen seniors, five per cent of the senior class, were initiated into the folds of the society in the candle-lit ceremony. The guest speaker for the induction was the Reverend Mr. Bernard L. White, minister of the Saint John the Baptist Church. Reverend White was born in Indianapolis, Indiana. He was graduated from Crispus Attuck High School in Indianapolis and from Indiana Central College. He received his theological training at the Butler University School of Religion. Reverend White has been president of the N.A.A.C.P. in South Bend for three terms, and president of the Board of the South Bend Urban League for one term.

The four tenets of National Honor Society were explained by the members prior to the induction. Speaking of scholarship was Marletta Simpson; character, Carol Ann Schiller; leadership, Barry Liss; and service, Sue Nelson. It is on the basis of these attributes that the selection of members is made.

After the ceremony, a tea was held in the library in honor of the inductees. Honor Society members served on the committee for the induction under the direction of Mr. Thomas Keiser, faculty advisor.

The topic which was debated was, Resolved: That the federal government should substantially increase its regulation of labor unions. Representing Adams on the affirmative side were Sandy Janovsky and Karl King. Bob Grant and Elizabeth Hodes debated for Adams on the side of the negative. In addition to these four debaters, Mr. Devon Bates, coach of the debate team, Eileen Olcott, and Juris Lasmanis, observers, and Mr. Thomas Keiser attended the tournament.

Two rounds of debates were held before noon. Both the affirmative and the negative Adams teams won. This placed them in the running for first place. After lunch, a final, crossexamination debate was held. Bob and Elizabeth won this by default. They, Eileen, Juris, and Mr. Keiser then sat in on the final Adams debate, cheering Sandy and Karl to victory.

Because this tournament was held chiefly to provide experience for participants, no prizes were given.

There has been a major change this year in the A.F.S. program. Due to the increasing number of applicants, all preliminary selections were made. and all final forms completed, by November 1. In past years, February 1 was the deadline date.

The faculty selection committee at Adams is composed of four permanent members and three other members chosen for a one-year term. Their selections are made through the following processes: reviewing preliminary applications; screening the students; making preliminary selections with the aid of the exchange student of the previous year; and the final selection.

Final selections are made in New York. The following points are considered: the high school achievement record, comments written by the applicant on the AFS program, and the recommendation sheet of the high school faculty committee.

Nomination by Adams does not necessarily mean that an Adams student will receive an appointment. However, there has been an Adams American Field Service representative every summer since 1953.

Veterans Day

Next Wednesday the citizens of the United States will pause to celebrate Veterans Day. It is necessary for us, as students and as American citizens, to understand the background and importance of this celebration.

November 11, 1954, marked the date of the first Veterans Day, which was enacted into law on June 1, of the same year. This legal holiday was formerly called Armistice Day, and it commemorated the end of actual fighting in World War I. After World War II and the Korean conflict, many individuals felt that Armistice Day had become too limited in scope, and thus, Congress passed a bill which became Public Law No. 380 and officially provided for the celebration of Veterans Day. Now we recognize veterans of all wars at this time.

Veterans Day should be a solemn occasion, - a time when one is reminded of the value of peace and the perils of war. We, a free-dom-loving people, are also aware of the important balance of freedom and peace. Douglas Jerrold expressed the sentiments of the American people well when he said, "We love peace, but not peace at any price." Veterans Day serves as a reminder that Americans desire peace, but that they demand liberty.




TOWER:


Eagles To End Campaign At City Tonight Redskins Deal Adams 6 - 0 Defeat For Winning Season

About 3,500 fans saw the Adams Eagles drop their fourth game of the season by the slimmest margin, 6-0, last Friday, October 30. The game, scoreless until the last quarter, was a display of hard-hitting lines, rugged defensive play, and spark-

defensive play, and spark-ling pass-and-run plays. Adams could gather little steam as neither could Goshen until their touchdown drive, cli-maxed by a four-yard plunge by Redskin half-back Bill Johnson, which came with 6:34 left to play.

play. Late in the third stan-za, the Eagles marched to the Redskin 20-yard line after Mickey Strick-lin, subbing for John Weiss, had scampered for 9 yards. An illegal pro-cedure penalty pushed them back to a fourth down, five-yard situation and Stricklen was able to make only three as the ball went over to Goshen
