## Season Tickets Now on Sale

Would you like to have a reserved seat on the main floor at a pep assembly? One Adams home room will be thus honored as the winner of the Monogram Club Booster Club's contest. They are conducting the contest to boost the season ticket sale at Adams and to thereby increase attendance at the football games.

The contest involves the purchasing of season football tickets. It is to be run among the home rooms of the school with the winner being the home room having the greatest percentage of season ticket holders. The season ticket holders of that winning home room will have main floor seats at a pep assembly reserved for them.

A member is assigned to each home room. His duties include handling the applications and tickets and regulating the chart which marks the progress of the home room. Monogram Club members will post home room results at Four Corners each day. An additional chart will show the percentage of the student body which has purchased season tickets.

The price of the ticket is \$1.75 for students and \$3.00 for adults. Compared to the price of single admission tickets, the season tickets afford a savings of \$.75 to students and \$2.00 to adults. Season tickets are valid for this year's football games with Riley, Goshen, North Side (Fort Wayne), Washington, and Central.

As the words "Will subject teachers now dismiss their students to the assembly" echo through the building to begin each pep assembly, the band members gathered at the Four Corners landing are given the downbeat. The first chair players of the various sections compose this Four Corners band. They play everything from "All Hail to the Scarlet and Blue" to "When the Saints Go Marching In" as the Eagles race from their classes to the auditorium.

The entire band performs in the auditorium at the pep assemblies. Besides playing the school song at the beginning and end of each assembly, the band accompanies the cheerleaders in various cheers. Booming drums and blaring trum-

pets add sparkle to the cheers. This year, the band and cheerleaders are working toward better coordination in all cheers.

At the actual football games, the band plays both in the stands and on the field. ## Eagles Face Tough Season

The Adams Eagles will open the 1961 season by playing the Riley Wildcats at School Field. The Adams home game is set for 8 p.m. on Saturday, September 9th. The Wildcats are one of the most experienced squads in this year's ENIHSC.

One week later on September 16, the Eagles will test the strength of Goshen. Adams defeated the Redskins last year by a score of 33-0.

Fort Wayne North will meet the Eagles September 23 at School Field. The North Siders have been defeated by the Eagles in two previous encounters by the scores of 26-20 and 20-7, respectively.

### Eagles Invade Tupper Field

On October 6 the team will travel to Tupper Field to do battle with the Mishawaka Cavemen and attempt to avenge the defeat dealt them last year. The Eagles were downed 39-20 by a fine Mishawaka team. In Coach Planutis's opinion Mishawaka is one of the most formidable opponents the Eagles will face this season.

Friday, October 13, the Eagles will visit the Slicers of LaPorte whom they did not play last year.

City foe Washington will provide the next opposition for the Eagles October 20 at School Field. The Panthers bested the Eagles by a margin of 25-12 in their last encounter.

Coach Planutis's squad will make their final road appearance on Friday, October 27, when the Eagles tangle with the Blue Blazers of Elkhart. The Blazers defeated the Eagles last year 14-7.

The Eagles will wind up their 1961 campaign when they battle the Central Bears. They will seek to avenge a 20-7 defeat suffered at the hands of the Bears last season. The ranks of the Bears have been thinned by graduation this year, but nevertheless they are not to be underestimated.

The Adams squad will be trying to better the 3-3 mark they attained last year in conference play. They held an overall mark of three wins and six losses.

In reviewing the Conference race this year it is certain that the Cavemen of Mishawaka will have an upper hand as far as depth and experience are concerned. The Mishawaka squad has sixteen lettermen returning from last year. Included among these are two fine throwing quarterbacks who accounted for a great deal of Mishawaka success in their 1960 campaign.

## Adams Welcomes New Coach

Among the nineteen new teachers at Adams this fall is Mr. Gerald Planutis. Mr. Planutis shares several similarities with the other new staff members, but he also possesses a singular characteristic.

Like the other eighteen new Adams teachers, Mr. Planutis will have new names and faces to learn. He will conduct his classes in a somewhat unfamiliar building and will work with a new group of fellow teachers. With the other new teachers, he will be formally introduced to the students at Friday's Back-to-School Assembly. Mr. Planutis's singular characteristic is one shared with no other new teacher at Adams, however. He is the new coach of the Eagles' football team, replacing Mr. Robert Scannell who resigned from the Adams faculty last spring.

Mr. Planutis comes to us from Indiana University and brings

Many teen-agers do not like football because they are not acquainted with the rules, fouls, and penalties of the game. Football as Americans know it was made possible by an incident in 1824 at Rugby, England. ## UNDER THE EAGLES WINGS

The season's opener with the Riley Wildcats will mark the first endeavor for the Eagles under their head coach Jerry Planutis. The Eagles were defeated by Riley on October 14 of last year by a score of 7-0.

Coach Planutis has eight returning lettermen to serve as a nucleus for this year's team. This should enable him to field a team that is not greatly hindered by inexperience.

The coaches have been working with the players since practice began August 15. The coaches and the players have done and are doing their part to make the '61 season a successful one.

Their efforts combined with the desire and determination to win and solid support from the student body could result in a winning season for the Eagles under Coach Planutis.

In last year's encounter with Riley the Eagles made one mistake which proved to be fatal. They fumbled on the third play of the game, and, as a result, the Wildcats scored the one and only touchdown of the game. With this game in the record books, the Eagles held a 1-3 conference mark compared to Riley's 2-2 record in the ENIHSC.

However, I don't think it can be said that the Eagles were beaten by a better team. The Wildcats recovered three of our fumbles while Adams recovered only one from Riley. The Eagles, concentrating for the most part on a running game, were plagued by a muddy field. A steady deluge of rain kept the ball wet and as a result the Eagles committed many fumbles. The Eagles simply did not receive any good breaks.

The Adams squad played a fine defensive game despite the foul weather in holding the Cats scoreless for the remainder of the contest. The Cats had a first down on the Eagle seven-yard line with thirteen seconds left to play in the game. Then, with just two seconds left on the second down the Eagles caused them to fumble and recovered.

## Freshmen Ready For '61 Campaign

Frosh Coach Cas Swartz was greeted by a good turnout for the '61 season. More than 35 hopeful football players were present for the opening session of summer practice.

There are many things that the freshman coaches must accomplish with their players. The players must be taught the basic fundamentals of football. They must also be taught how to protect themselves from serious injury. Finally the coaches must prepare them for future varsity competition.

Freshman games are usually held on Thursday afternoons at 4 o'clock. Home games are played on the field behind the school.

### Freshman Football Schedule
