



Seagle Squad Best in School History

At the current rate of improvement, all signs point hopefully to a 1963-64 state swimming championship for Coach Don Coar's Seagles. In this year's state finals, the swimmers were runnerup for the second year in succession. South Bend Riley was the nemesis in the 1962, Columbus in 1963. Perhaps next year there won't be one.

Only three seniors from the squad are graduating this spring, but all three will be sorely missed. Al Callum, Pete Hayes, and Tom Condon were all members of the state champion relay squads, as well as outstanding individual performers in the breaststroke and freestyle respectively. In addition, Hayes and Callum were named co-captains for the '62-'63 season, and Hays won the Kiwanis award.

Thirteen new school records were established during the season. The only marks not erased were the 200-yard freestyle relay and the diving records.

During most of the season, it appeared as if the Seagles were able to best everyone but Central. A dual meet record of 11-1 was marred only by a narrow setback at the hands of the Bears, a loss which cost Adams the ENIHSC dual meet crown. The Seagles were second in the South Bend City Meet, with 86½ points to Central's 93½. The Bears and Riley edged Adams in the NIHSC finals, scoring 60 and 56 points respectively to the Seagles' 52. The Adams swimmers also added a second place finish in the Kokemo Invitational to their laurels.

In the first sectional swim meet ever held, Coach Coar's squad surprised many people by capturing the title and qualifying the most swimmers for the State meet, held on February 22-23 at Indiana University in Bloomington. The Seagles tallied 82 points in the sectional to Central's 67.

Then in the state finals, the Adams' swimmers put forth a tremendous effort by scoring 56 points, only 12 behind champion Columbus, who was winning its fourth title in five years.

State champions for Adams included Chuck Busse in the 50-yard freestyle, Joe Scheer in the one-meter diving, and both the 200-yard medley and freestyle relay teams. The former was made up of Dan Jones, Al Callub, Lee Wise, and Pete Hayes, while the latter included Tom Condon, Dick Wachs, Hayes, and Chuck Busse.

Wise was awarded the MVP trophy, and he and Dan Jones were named captains for next year.

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O'Neal, Bradley Graduating Cagers

Led by two outstanding senior rebounders, the 1962-63 Adams basketball team surprised many experts by posting a winning record of 11-10 for the season. Seniors Mike O'Neal and Ken Bradley were recipients of the most valuable player and rebound awards at the campaign's end.

Coach Warren Seaborg's squad was involved in a fifth place tie in the ENIHSC race, winning four and losing five.

In undoubtedly the most disappointing moment of the season, the Eagles were beaten by Riley 57-50 in the first game of the sectional tourney. Adams had dumped the Wildcats during the regular season, 68-56.

With only two lettermen returning from 1961-62's outstanding team, the prospects for a winning campaign this year seemed very slight. But the Eagles started quickly with victories over Gary Wallace, Sheridan, and Washington-Clay. After three straight one-sided defeats, Seaborg's squad ran wild in a 92-44 romp over Wabash.

A win over St. Joseph's was followed by one of the best Adams' performances of the year, a 74-63 triumph over Mishawaka. After a loss to Central and a win over Hobart, the Eagles lost a pair of close games to LaPorte and highly-ranked Gary Roosevelt.

Next came the victory over Riley, but it was followed by two more losses. The Eagles closed the regular season impressively by trouncing Elkhart and Fort Wayne North. Hopes were high for the state tournament, but Riley immediately destroyed them.

Juniors Bob Gilbert and Bill Fischer led the squad in scoring with averages of 15.5 and 10.1 respectively. Fischer also received the captain's star.

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Wrestlers Post 7-4-1 Dual Record

The 1962-63 season for the Adams' wrestling team turned out to be a highly successful one. The grapplers, coached by Morris Aronson, compiled a dual meet record of 7-4-1.

The matmen had seven returning lettermen, six of whom were seniors. They were Don Smothers, Steve Nelson, Denny Rose, Mike Teeter, Norval Williams, and Don Martens. Seniors John Hostrawser and John Gordon also saw a lot of action during the season.

Norval Williams led the Eagle wrestlers by gaining his way down to the state finals where he placed third in the 180-pound weight division. Williams was also undefeated in dual meet competition. His second and final defeat came in the NIHSC trials, although he ended up winning the conference finals.

Don Smothers also had a fine year, losing only three times. John Hostrawser also represented Adams well as he copped the heavyweight crown of the South Bend sectional.

The highest team accomplishment was a fine second-place finish in the conference finals. In this meet the Eagles scored 43 points to finish 10 points behind state champ Hammond, a team which Adams defeated in dual meet competition during the campaign.

Other dual meet victories came over South Bend Washington, 33-19, East Chicago Washington, 37-11, Elkhart, 32-14, Washington-Clay, 22-20, LaPorte, and Penn.

In addition to this, the Eagle grapplers placed third in the conference trials, the city meet, and the sectional.

Norval Williams won the MVP, while John Hostrawser was awarded the Kiwanis trophy. Williams was also '62-'63 captain. Junior Mike Slabaugh was named captain for the 1963-64 season.

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Divoters Led By Three Seniors

The John Adams golf team, coached by Ernie Kaeppler, completed a relatively successful 1963 season two weeks ago, missing a trip to the state golf finals by only six strokes. In the sectional, which was held at the Elcona Country Club near Elkhart on May 17, the Eagle duffers finished fourth, one place lower than it takes to qualify for state competition.

The Eagles were led in most of their matches by three fine seniors, Buddy Bushman, Linn Derickson, and Jim Naus. All three boys played consistent golf throughout the season with each capable of coming up with a good game to lead the team on a given day.

The final record compiled by the divoters was 9-5. However, four of the five losses were administered by Riley and LaPorte, two teams who are strong contenders for the state title. The fifth loss came at the hands of the Michigan City Red Devils, a team Adams had defeated earlier in the season.

Other victories for the Eagle golfers were scored over Central, Mishawaka, Elkhart, and Goshen. Adams defeated each of these teams twice during the course of the season. The divoters only other competition was in the La-Porte Invitational, in which they finished 11th in a field of 26.

Jim Naus led the Eagle linksmen in four meets with his best score coming on Mishawaka's Eberhart-Petro course, where he shot a fine 71. Bushman and Derickson were both low men for Adams on one occasion. Bushman's best score was a 75 while Derickson's low was a 78.

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Gridders Improve To 3-5-1 Mark

With one full year of coaching already tucked away, Jerry Planutis coached the 1962 Adams football teams to a 3-5-1 season, two victories better than the previous year. The Eagles' 2-3-1 record was good for a seventh place finish in the ENIHSC.

For the Eagles the season was one of ups and down, with most of the downs coming in the latter half of the season. This year's squad, however, was a great improvement over the 1961 team, which suffered through a 1-6-1 season.

The Eagles opened the season play at School Field on September 8, when they were tipped by the Riley Wildcats, the team that eventually represented the ENIHSC in the conference playoff, 13-6. The first win of the season came on the turf of Goshen's Foreman Field, where Adams slipped by the Redskins by a 19-12 count.

On the following Friday the Eagles managed to keep a hold on the conference lead, as they upended Fort Wayne North, 20-7, in a game played at Fort Wayne. Adams continued its winning ways the next week-end by dropping the visiting Cadets from the Culver Military Academy by a margin of 25-12. This left Adams tied with Washington for the conference lead with a 2-0 record.

This position was short lived, however, as the highly touted Mishawaka Cavemen came to School Field where they outlasted Adams in a hard fought game,

For the second week in a row the Eagles faced a highly regard team as the LaPorte Slicers, ranked fourth in the state, visited School Field. Planutis' inspired team definitely outplayed the Slicers in the best Eagle performance of the year, but couldn't find the goal line when it counted, and had to settle for a 7-7 tie.

It continued to get more difficult for the Eagles to reach pay-dirt, as they were shut out in their next two games. The first loss came at the hands of city-foe Washington, 20-0. On the following Saturday Elkhart came to School Field and jolted Adams by a 26-0 count.

The final game of the season for Adams was a conference tilt with arch-rival Central, who, on the strength of a second-half scoring splurge, defeated the Eagles 26-6.

In conference play, Adams was outscored 96-58, while overall the Eagles tallied 89 points to their opponents' 141.

Honors went to seniors Bob Johnson and Don Martens. Johnson was named captain for the season, and he also copped the Kiwanis award. Martens was named the most valuable player.

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Rowe's Last Team Successful Again

In a season which has seen several all-time Indiana high school track and field records broken, the Adams track team, under the direction of Duane Rowe again established itself as one of the best squads in the area.

Jim Nidiffer, Adams half-miler, participated in the state finals at Indianapolis Tech last Saturday. He is one of nine seniors who led the squad to a 9-1 dual meet record for the 1963 campaign. The others are dashmen John Blair and Denny Rose, quarter-milers Mike O'Neal and Gary Dominy, milers Denny Drake, and Bill Spink, high jumper Mickey Neal, and broad jumper Jack Robinson. Nidiffer and Blair served as co-captains.

Dual meet victories came over Washington-Clay, LaPorte, Goshen, Mich. City, Riley, Mishawaka, St. Joseph's, Central, and Washington. The lone defeat was at the hands of Elkhart. Also the Eagles were third at the Goshen Relays with 38 points, fifth in the ENIHSC trials with 27 points, eleventh in the NIHSC finals with 8 points, second in the sectional with 27½ points, seventh in the regional with nine points, and city champs for the third straight year with 73½ points.

Two school records were set during the season. Nidiffer, who several times bested two minutes in the half-mile, recorded his peak effort in the NIHSC finals when he ran the 880 in 1:57.1. Jim also posted winning times of 1:58.1 in the conference trials, and 1:58.7 in the sectional. His winning regional performance was 2:00.9.

The mile relay squad twice posted times of 3:32.0 for new school marks. On April 6 a team composed of Gary Dominy, Mike O'Neal, freshman Emerson Carr, and Nidiffer set the record, and on May 2 a foursome of Nidiffer, Carr, sophomore Maurice Miller, and O'Neal equaled the time.

Other outstanding performances included clockings of :10.2 and :22.2 by John Blair in the 100- and 220-yard dashes, respectively, and :51.4 by Mike O'Neal in the 440.

This season marks the last year as head track coach for Rowe.

Netters Gain Twin City Championship

The 1962 Adams tennis team had a fine year, posting a nifty 5-3 record in one of the most difficult tennis conferences in the state. The squad, under the direction of Coach Ernie Kaeppler, earned a fourth-place finish in the ENIHSC and also copped the twin-city title for the first time since 1958.

There were three seniors on this year's squad. Don Woodward was second-man on the team, although he was the leading point producer for the season. Sandy Wilson was the third-man and Tom Hull was a doubles specialist. Woodward and Wilson also joined together to form a doubles team. Woodward was awarded the most valuable player honor, while Wilson was voted one of the captain's stars.

Eagle victories included wins against Michigan City, 3-2, Mishawaka, 4-1; LaPorte, 5-0; and Central, 5-0. An earlier win over Mishawaka was the team's fifth victory.

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City Title Won By Cross-CountryTeam

Coach Dale Gibson's 1962 crosscountry team compiled an 8-9 record in dual meet competition, but highlighted the season by capturing the city title on October 16. In that meet the Eagle harriers scored 47 points and senior Jim Nidiffer took first place.

At the LaPorte regional, held on October 27, the team finished twelfth and Nidiffer managed to come in third and qualify for the state meet in Indianapolis on November 3. Jim turned in a tremendous performance there as he placed sixth among all of Indiana's best runners.

The 1963 squad will be missing seven graduating seniors. Included among them are captain Denny Drake, Jim Nidiffer, Clarence Patterson, Bill Spink, Dave Kress, Tom Calder, and Max Arens. Nidiffer was awarded the MVP in cross-country for the '62 campaign.

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Baseball Squad Loses Six Seniors

Coach Don Truex's fifth season as head baseball coach at Adams proved to be a rather disappointing one as his Eagles won five while losing ten. Although Adams was expected to be a contender for the ENIHSC title, the squad posted only a 2-5 conference mark to place well down the league ladder. Injuries to a pair of key performing seniors, third baseman Bob Johnson and catcher John Hostrawser, hurt the club's chances for a more successful campaign. Johnson missed several games with a dislocated shoulder, while Hostrawser sat out two contests with a dislocated finger.

Four other seniors join Johnson and Hostrawer to form the rank of departing graduates. They are shortstop Ron Dorland, leftfielder Mike Teeter, rightfielder Steve Schock, and pitcher Carrol Jordan. Hostrawser led the team in five batting departments, including a .444 average and 12 runs batted in. Schock posted the second highest mark by hitting .313. Teeter, who led the team during the second half of the season, hit .282, while Johnson had a .286 mark, and Dorland a .167 figure. Jordan had a 2-4 mound record, although he posted a fine 1.66 earned run average while striking out 45 in 56

As a team, Adams batted .228, while fielding at a .915 pace. Probably the highlight of the season was sophomore Vic Butsch's 1-0 no-hitter over St. Joseph's on April 26. The Eagles were eliminated by Washington-Clay in the first round of the annual city baseball tournament on May 18 by a score of 2-1.

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
