You have attended John Adams High School at another very interesting and challenging period of its history, one of tremendous growth in enrollment, one of the planning of a third building addition costing

nearly two million dollars, and one of many new curriculum developments. When you enrolled as freshmen in September, 1960, there were less than 1,600 students

enrolled and we had just moved into a new addition consisting of 21 classrooms. Within your generation of the student body, your school has grown to an enrollment of 2,000 and because of the increase in enrollment another addition consisting of 30 teaching stations was planned for construction beginning this summer. Beginning your sophomore year you have been housed in very crowded conditions including 7:10 classes, partitioned classrooms, and substandard space used for class-

By September, 1965, we expect to have our new facilities. We cordially invite you to return to see the new additions and the remodeled areas planned in the present building. We do appreciate the willingness that most of you displayed in accepting the necessity of meeting classes at unusual hours and in unusual places. With the understanding attitude of you and your teachers, it seems you have been able to achieve as well as other graduating classes. For example, three members of your class received National Merit Scholarships. This is the largest number of such scholarships received by any of our graduating classes. Also, it is interesting to note that your class is the largest graduating class of any South Bend high school in the last decade.






