

Varsity Cagers To Open At St. Joe Nov. 20

Sophomores To Play Key Role As Only Haak, Butsch are Returning Lettermen

"Yes, our success will be based on the experience we gain, game by game." These were the words head basketball coach Warren Seaborg related in an interview last week. "Our strength lies mainly with our two returning lettermen, Bogden Haak and Vic Butsch, and how well last year's successful freshman basketballers fare against varsity competition." Thus, as Coach Seaborg prepared to begin his 15th year at the helm of an Adams quintet, a question mark crossed his face.

Only two lettermen return from last year's cagers. Bogden Haak, a senior guard who played in fourteen games last year, scoring 38 points and shooting a respectable 67% from the charity stripe, returns, as does Vic Butsch. Butsch is also a senior guard, who last year was one of only four players to see action in every game, scoring 128 points on 54 field goals and 18 out of 24 from the free throw line. Emerson Carr and Shaun Floyd, both sophomores last year who earned their letters, moved to Central and Fresno, Calif., respectively.

Sophs Challenge

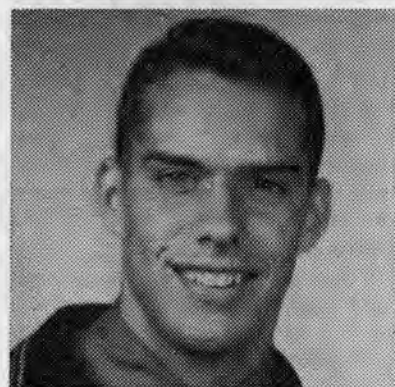
Last year's frosh basketballers, the most successful freshman team in Adams' history, comprise the nucleus of this year's team.

Kent Ross, a tall, aggressive-type of player, will probably open the season at the center position but will be challenged for the starting role by senior Pete Toth. Sophomore John Kaiser will see action at one of the forward spots as will junior Dean Lovings who will also probably alternate with Haak and Butsch at the guards. Chuck Supercznski is vying for the other forward position but is being challenged heavily by Dick Foley and Ron Bethke, both seniors.

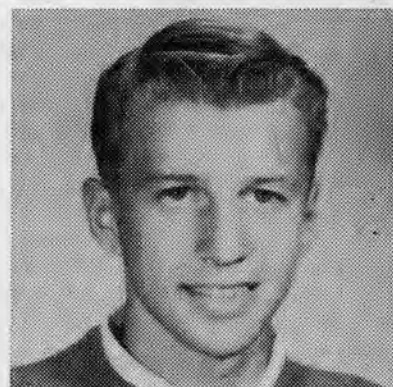
Junior Larry Williams, a small but ball-hawking guard who jumps as if he were a center, is putting in a serious bid for a starting position as a guard. Sophomores Dave Gordon and Larry Williams (another Williams to confuse the sportscasters) are trying out for varsity positions.

Footballers Just Start

Other members of the present team include Mike Aronson, Phil Williford, and Ernie Rosin. Coach Seaborg has not cut the team down yet, due to the fact that the football players began practicing only this past

week. As in past years, Seaborg will probably carry only 12 men the entire year and must cut this list down to 10 players by sectional time in February.

The Eagles show only one new team on the schedule this year, Warsaw. The contest is scheduled for Dec. 5, at Warsaw. Warsaw, a team that went undefeated this season in football and finished in the top ten in the state, replaces Wabash, a team that dropped the Eagles last year on a last minute basket, 64-63.

Next Friday, Nov. 20, Coach Seaborg's squad will travel to St. Joseph where "scalping" is the word. The Indians, who were upset, 67-64 by Adams last year, lost their top scorer Mike Canfield via graduation.

The following Wednesday, Nov. 25, Adams travels to the Steel City where they will play their traditional pre-Thanksgiving game against Gary Lew Wallace. Last year the score stood 67-53, in favor of the Eagles. Lew Wallace usually has a fine team and this year is no exception with height being its greatest asset.

First Conference Game

Goshen is the first Northern Indiana conference foe for Adams when the Eagles travel to meet the Redskins on Dec. 11. Muncie South Side, a team that is rapidly becoming a basketball power, will visit South Bend on Dec. 18 and 19. On the 18th the Rebels will face Clay and the following night they will try for a repeat 72-50 victory performance against the Eagles.

Mishawaka has again invited the Eagles to its Holiday Tourney to be played on Monday and Tuesday of the week beginning Dec. 28.

In the second-half of the '64-'65 campaign, the Eagles face seven conference foes plus an always-tough Gary Roosevelt five. The Gary Roosevelt game must be termed as last year's highlight game. The Panthers invaded the Adams gymnasium last January ranked number one in the state. After the first three quarters the Eagles were holding

Washington Rates As Best in Area

The Washington Panthers could very likely represent this area as a state-wide powerhouse this coming basketball season. Coach Subby Nowicki's team should have a very successful season with many returning from last year's fine squad. Floyd and Lloyd Kerr return to face a formidable schedule that includes Benton Harbor, East Chicago Roosevelt, and two Hammond teams. Senior George Johnson, an outstanding rebounder, also returns.

Coach Jim Power's Central Bears could prove to be Washington's strongest competition in the area. Juniors Karl Simon, Leon Davis, and Richard Smith all will be back this year as graduation took only the brilliant Mike Warren and jumpin' Jimmy Ward.

But the Bears this year face probably the toughest competition in Indiana high school basketball. Not only must they contend with the Northern Indiana Conference, but they also face such powerhouses as Indianapolis Washington, Kokomo, Gary Roosevelt, East Chicago Washington, Muncie Central, Anderson, and a Lebanon team which plays a team from New York City this year boasting the nation's longest prep winning streak and a seven-foot center.

New Coach at Riley

Riley will have John Byers, John Nelson, and Tony Shelton returning for new coach Bruce Smith's Wildcats. Dennis Baldwin leads the list of returnees at Mishawaka. St. Joseph, who just recently emerged as the state's number one football power, is anticipating a very successful season, with Ken Hass, Mark Hurtubise, and Jim Sniadecki returning.

The Elkhart Blue Blazers, last year's regional champs who bowed to eventual state runner-up Huntington in the semi-state, lost the nucleus of their team. Mike Franger is the only veteran varsity performer returning as the Blazers lost Ted Reasoner, Dick Penrod, and Dean Foster from last year's quintet.

Michigan City, Fort Wayne North, and Goshen are in the rebuilding stages as the Red Devils lost last season's top two conference scoring leaders, Vernon Payne and John Selke. Payne and Selke finished one-two in the

Basketball Season Ticket Sale To Start On Nov. 18

The sale of basketball season tickets will begin in home rooms on Wednesday, Nov. 18 and will continue through Saturday, Dec. 12.

This year the Booster Club will be assisting Mr. William Pryzbyz, ticket manager, with the sale of the season tickets. There is a ticket representative assigned to selling season tickets in each home room. These representatives collect the money and applications from the students and issue them their tickets the next day. By using this method, the Booster Club hopes to give every student an opportunity to purchase a ticket.

The prices for the season tickets are \$3.00 for students and \$6.00 for adults. This covers all nine of

the home games this season. The single game ticket will cost 50 cents for students. The price of single adult tickets is \$1.00. A saving of \$1.50 can be made by purchasing a season ticket. A season ticket also eliminates the bother of buying a ticket before each game.

Season ticket holders have other advantages. Only season ticket holders may sit in the bleachers while all others must sit in the balcony. Perhaps the most important benefit is that season ticket holders have first choice on seats for the tourney games in February.

Mr. Pryzbyz has set this year's goal at 800 tickets. Every student is urged to purchase a season ticket to help support both the team and the school.

It's That Time Of Year **B-Team Cheerleaders Hard At Work Since Beginning Of School Year**

It all began back on Oct. 1, the earliest possible date for Indiana high school basketball teams to begin practicing the king of all Hoosier sports. It won't end until Saturday, March 20, 1965, when ten happy boys, a school bursting with pride, and a state exhausted from excitement, realize that the end has come to another season.

What is it? Simple — it's Hoosier Hysteria, the time of year when millions of usually sound, sane Indiana citizens become zany with the thrills accompanying basketball in this basketball-mad state.

Let Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Texas have their great high school football teams. Let California and Illinois have their ranks of record-breaking prep swimmers. Indiana has its Hoosier Hysteria and rare is the Indiana basketball fan who won't defend his state's high school cagers as the best anywhere.

Just look at some of the super-stars Indiana has contributed to the national basketball scene. Foremost, of course, is the fabulous Oscar Robertson of the professional Cincinnati Royals, who, in our opinion, is the finest all-around cage player in history. Robertson played his high school ball at Indianapolis Crispus Attucks and led the Tigers to two consecutive state championships, in 1955 and 1956. He went on to become the first three-time collegiate scoring champ in history at the University of Cincinnati, and now is one of the great stars of pro ball.

OTHER RECENT HEROES

There have been others, too. Ron Bonham, another University of Cincinnati All-American, starred at Muncie Central, leading the 1960 Bearcat squad to a state runner-up place.

And then there was Mel Garland, Indianapolis Tech star who captained last year's Purdue squad; Dick Barnett of Gary Roosevelt, now with the Los Angeles Lakers; and of course those great Indiana University heroes — Jimmy Rayl of Kokomo and the VanArsdale twins of Indianapolis Manual.

Right here in South Bend we've had high school players who were outstanding, also. Remember Adams' Buddy McKnight, who thrilled Eagle followers back in 1958-60? Or Deacon Davis, the rebounding center of Adams' 1958 sectional champions? Or John and Sylvester Coalmon and Herbie Lee of Central's 1957 state champs? Or Adams' Eddie Butler, the mild-mannered center who was great here in 1960 but went on to become greater at Ball State.

These are but a few of the many idols of local, area, and state fans — players who have made Indiana basketball everything that it is. And some more young men will soon be adding another page to the illustrious history book.

Yep, it's good ol' Hoosier Hysteria. If you know the thrills accompanying it, we know you're looking forward to more this season. If you've never before discovered the excitement, we hope that this is the year that you do.

And what easier chance is there to see Indiana basketball than to buy a season ticket and go out and support that team that we hope will fulfill our high hopes in the coming season. Let's ALL be out at St. Joe on Nov. 20 and ALL be here on Dec. 4 when our Eagles open their home season against Clay, because it's that time of year again.

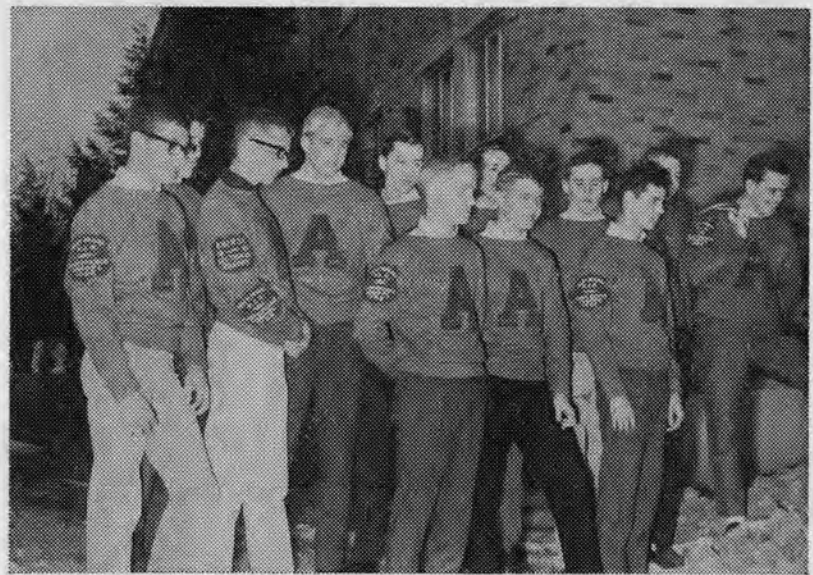
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a slight edge but in the waning minutes the visitors went ahead for a 71-63 triumph.

Seagles Look Forward To Another Great Year

Bang! That's the sound that many enthusiastic swimming fans will hear on Dec. 1, when the Seagles take to the water against Valparaiso at 4:00 in the latter's home pool.

Coach Don Coar's defending conference champs will open the 1964-65 season with 13 returning lettermen. Co-captains Bob Nelsen and Chuck Busse, both members of the state champion freestyle relay team last year and Busse an individual victor in the 50-yard freestyle, lead the veterans returning.

Other lettermen include senior Joe Condon, an individual medley and butterfly specialist; junior Tom Decker, a distance and sprint freestyler; Jeff Hauffaire, a junior sprint freestyle and his brother Joe, a sophomore distance freestyler. Another sophomore, Paul Goetz, earned his letter last year and was a member of the 1964 State champion medley relay team.

Also, senior Tom Heck, who swims the butterfly; junior Reid Lichtenfels, a diver, and Mike Nova, the team's strongest breaststroker, return to varsity competition this year. Chuck Swinsick, a junior backstroker, Gert Walter, a distance freestyler, and manager Bert Stallman all earned their letters last year and will be back to fill the void left by six graduating lettermen.

Show Potential

In addition to the returning lettermen, there are other boys who show potential for the '64-'65 campaign. Jon Ries, a junior freestyler, and Richard Altman and Gary Gibboney, two sophomores, will be contending for varsity positions. Scott Madison, Steve Schragger, and Gary Sechrist are also showing varied ability in practice. Mike Fitzgerald and Mark Huey as well as Rich Rosenstein also figure in Coach Coar's plans this year.

Riley and Central should prove to be the toughest competition in the immediate area and Culver Military Academy and St. Joseph, Mich., loom as threats to upset the Seagles. Coach Coar is also in the progress of trying to schedule a meet against Battle Creek, Mich., a team that finished third last year in the Michigan State Meet and was described as being better than last year's Indiana State Champs, Columbus.

Edged in Finals

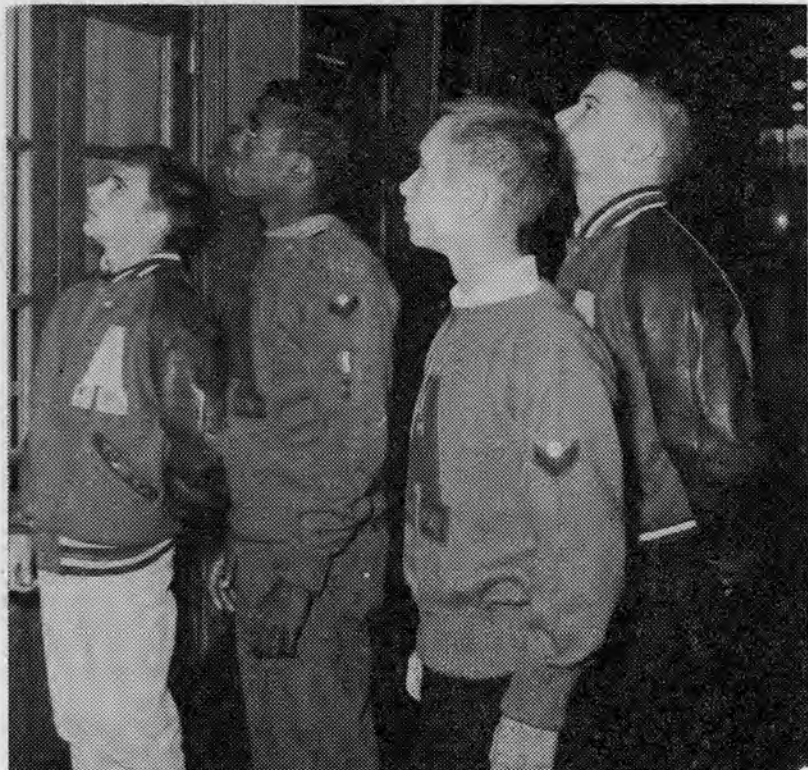

FIVE LETTERMEN GREET COACH ARONSON

Coach Morris Aronson is expressing hopes of another fine season for his 1964-65 wrestles. He points out the fact that the wrestlers will not have a squad wholly composed of seniors due to the fact that three out of the five returning lettermen are juniors or sophomores.

Captain Gary Zalas leads those returning to face another tough schedule of very respectable opponents. Gary, who last year earned a second place in the State Meet losing in the waning seconds, will probably still wrestle in the 103-pound class. Sophomore Doug Rothkoph, who last year wrestled in the 93-pound category, returns as a letter-winner, as does Jim Russell, who last year represented the Eagles at 112 pounds. Junior Gene Turner also returns as a letterman. Senior Tom Quimby earned his letter last year wrestling in the 154-pound class.

Aronson also mentioned that many other boys who did not receive their letter last year or who formulated the "B" team will be back to comprise the nucleus of this year's team. This list includes Dane Donaldson, a letterman in football and baseball, Tim Hostrowser, who will probably either wrestle in the 180-pound class or in the heavyweight class, Ed Driver, and Spencer Rowell.
