

Cagers Hopeful Of Successful Year

Last Year's Starting Five Return to Face St. Joe Next Friday

It, speed, six returning lettermen—these are the factors that seem to point toward success for Don Barnbrook in this, his first year, as head basketball coach at Adams. In an interview last week, however, Coach Barnbrook cited two things that must come about if the team is going to reach its potential this season. First, all personnel must blend together properly and quickly. Second, the players must adapt to him and his system. If these things can be accomplished, Adams fans can look forward to hearing "sweet sounds" from the referee's whistle all year.

Unusually Tall Team

Three New Coaches To Serve at Adams

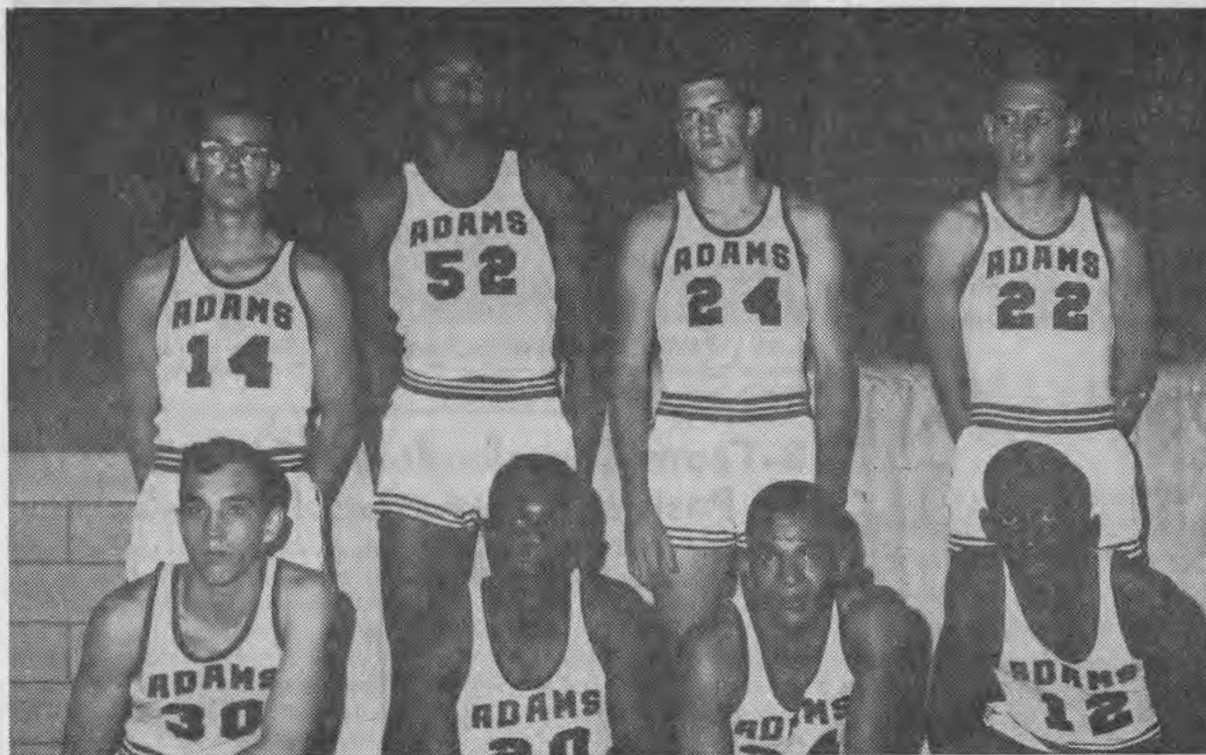
Don Barnbrook, the former coach of the Riley High School's State Championship golf team, is the new head basketball coach at Adams this year. He replaces 15-year coach Warren Seaborg, who was appointed principal of Coquillard School. Mr. Barnbrook graduated from Adams in 1944. Here he earned two letters in basketball and two in track. As a sophomore Don played under Principal Russell Rothermel on the "B" team. As a junior he was coached by Bob Primmer.

After serving two years in the Navy, Mr. Barnbrook received his B.A. degree from Olivet College in 1950. In 1953 he earned his M.A. degree from Indiana University.

Two New Assistants

Adams will also have two other new basketball coaches, David Hadaway and John Gassensmith. Mr. Hadaway will be coaching the "B" team. He graduated from Central High School where he played baseball and some basketball. From Central he went to Mississippi College and then received his master's degree from Notre Dame. For the last four years he taught social studies and was head basketball coach at Greene Township.

Mr. Gassensmith also graduated from Central High School and then went to Ball State. He served in the Marine Corps for two years and had been head basketball coach at Nuner for the last sixteen years. He will be coaching the freshman team at Adams this year.

use a patterned offense and fast break only when the opportunity arises. A set offense should prove successful because of the exceptional height possessed by this year's squad. On defense, at least at first, a man-to-man set-up will be used. Coach Barnbrook believes that before a team can use a zone to the best advantage, the man-to-man type must be mastered.

The list of lettermen returning from last year's squad totals six. Between them, they saw considerable action throughout last season's 10-win-and-12-loss campaign. The senior lettermen are Dean Lovings, Chuck Superczynski, and L. D. Williams, while the junior list is made up of David

Gordon, John Kaiser, and Kent Ross.

Top Scorer Returns

Kent Ross heads the list of returnees from last year. He led the team in scoring and rebounding, totaling 328 points for a 14.9 average. Ross will probably open at his familiar center position but will be challenged by junior Phil Williford, who played the pivot on last year's B-team. Ross is six feet five inches tall, while Williford stands six-foot-six. It is possible that one of these men will be moved to a forward slot.

At forward, the top candidates seem to be John Kaiser, who averaged 11 points and 10 rebounds per game last year, and Chuck Superszynski. Chuck scored at a clip of 12

points a game last season. Dean Lovings and junior Tom Taylor are also vying for starting berths at forward positions.

L.D. & Gordon at Guards

Top prospects for guards are L. D. Williams and David Gordon. L.D., the ball-hawking back court man who jumps as if he were a center, was the floor general of last year's quintet, but still managed to average seven points a game. Gordon didn't play a great deal but he did gain 30 quarters of experience. Others in contention for the starting guard positions are juniors Larry Wharton and Larry Williams, and senior Jim Richey.

Season Ticket Sale Continues to Nov. 23

The sale of basketball season tickets began on Monday of this week and will continue throughout the month until the half-time of the Gary Lew Wallace game on Nov. 23. These valuable little pasteboard cards are being made available through specially designated Booster Club representatives. For the price of \$3.00, student season ticket holders will be able to attend all nine of the scheduled home games.

Similar Procedure

A procedure similar to the one used last year is being used this season for ordering adult and student season tickets. Students place their orders with the homeroom representatives and tickets are issued several days later. This method enables every student to purchase a season ticket. Adults may order season tickets, selling for the price of \$6.00, by returning the application blanks issued through the students. Parents wishing to purchase a season ticket, assuring themselves of a reserved seat at all nine games, may send their requests through the mail or through a student. All adult season ticket sales are transacted through Mr. William Przybysz, Adams ticket manager, at the new ticket booth.

By purchasing a season ticket, students will make a saving of \$1.50. Single student tickets purchased in advance will cost 50 cents and tickets purchased at the door will be \$1.00 for both students and adults. Therefore, there is a savings of \$3.00 on the adult season ticket. A season ticket also eliminates the bother of buying a ticket before each game.

Advantages

Season ticket holders have several other advantages. Only student season ticket holders may sit in the bleachers while all others must sit in the balcony. One of (Continued on Page 2, Column 3)

Who'll Be The Next In Line?

The above question could well be the hackneyed expression heard between Nov. 19 and Feb. 26. Coach Don Barnbrook's tall, fast, and experienced Eagles will open their 1965-66 campaign next Friday against St. Joseph.

That game will mark the beginning of Hoosier Hysteria—the coined term used to describe the time of year when millions of usually sound, sane Indiana citizens become over-exuberant in their emotions for their respective high school teams.

Began October 1

The re-opening storybook of Hoosier Hysteria began last October 1, when over 550 schools took to the hardwood and began practicing for that ultimate goal—the state championship. Adams-Central games mean little, holiday tourney championships mean nothing, and conference championships are nice but not enough, because the game that every school dreams of is the Indiana High School Basketball Championship on March 19.

Basketball is definitely the sport of Indiana. More renowned basketball heroes have emerged from Indiana than any other state.

Story the Same Here

The legend of Indiana is much the same here at Adams. The Eagles are a "bunch" of talented players anxious to live up to their expectations.

Probably all the team needs is a little encouragement—that same type of spirit that was shown during the sectional last year when Adams came from behind to defeat Clay, and that same spirit put forth by a faithful student body who cheered Adams on against Central, although the Bears came out on top.

So the phrase who'll be the next in line might be the trite expression used to describe Eagle basketball fortunes this year. It even might be commonplace between now and sectional time in February.

Place The Face . . . Jay Goldman

Since this is the annual basketball issue, I felt that it was necessary to run an article on the man pictured here. Mr. X should be familiar to all. Mr. X served as the head coach of the John Adams basketball team for five years from 1943 to 1948. During this period his teams registered a record of 57 wins and 53 losses. In 1944, Mr. X's team won the Sectional championship and also came in second in the Conference.

Athletic Director

Mr. X is presently the Athletic Director at John Adams. He has also taught Social Studies and Physical Education at Adams and is presently teaching Driver's Education. Mr. X has been teaching Driver's Ed. since 1947.

If you haven't already guessed, I am speaking of Mr. Ralph Powell. Mr. Powell explains the main difference between basketball then and now. "Basketball today is a much faster game than it was twenty years ago. The kids are much bigger and are better shooters; also the emphasis of the game is placed on the offense and not the defense as it was in 1945."

An interesting sidelight: the present head basketball coach, Mr. Don Barnbrook, once played for Mr. Powell when he was the coach.

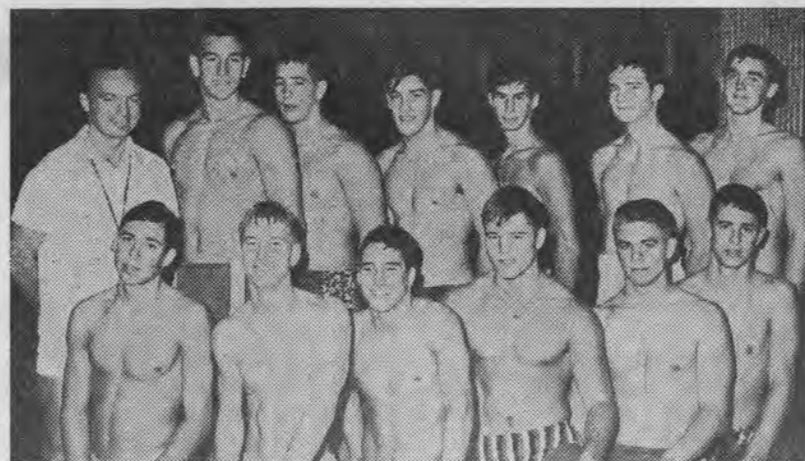
