them. Policemen feel the rising number of cyclists is alright, however, most are concerned with the rising accident rate.

In 1966 from January to August in South Bend, there have been ninety-two accidents resulting in seventy-two injuries and no fatalities, as compared to 1965 when there were seventy-two accidents, resulting in sixty-eight injuries and no fatalities.

The police realize that accidents involving motorcycles are usually not the fault of the cyclist but of the motorist. Motorists are ticketed in about seventy-five percent of the accidents with the major offense being failure to yield the right of way. Only twelve accidents in 1966 have not involved a collision between a car and a motorcycle.


