## CAGERS OPEN SEASON FRIDAY AT ST. JOE

"The game is scheduled for Friday night, it will be played in St. Joe's gym, tip-off time is 8:00, and you can count on us being there." These were the words Coach Don Barnbrook used last week to answer the question, "What about your opening game?"

With this comment, Coach Barnbrook returned to the floor of the gym to work with his second Adams basketball team. Awaiting him were abundant height, adequate speed, and six lettermen among the fourteen boys hoping to see varsity action this season.

Because of the particular talents of the team members, he is working on a new type of offense that they should be able to use effectively. As last year, a man-to-man set up will probably be used when the opposition has the ball.

### Six Return

The six returning lettermen are all seniors. Between them, they saw considerable action throughout last season's 13-win and 8-loss campaign. They are, in order of descending height, Phil Williford (6-6), Kent Ross (6-5), John Kaiser (6-3), Tom Taylor (6-2), David Gordon (5-10), and Larry Wharton (5-9).

Williford led this group in scoring last year with 274 points for a 13.7 average. Ross wasn't far behind, though, with 272 points. In the rebounding department, however, Ross held a slight advantage.

Gordon was the only other starter in the group. He played a guard position and led the team in steals with 39. Dave also had the third best shooting percentage on the team.

Although Taylor and Wharton did not start regularly for Coach Barnbrook last year, they did play a big role in the team's success as substitutes. Larry particularly played well against Goshen as a guard and Tom came off the bench in the LaPorte game and did an outstanding job at forward.

Kaiser, one of the top shooters on the team, was injured during the majority of last season. A football injury slowed him up at the start of the campaign and just when he thought he was alright, he re-injured it.

A senior, non-letterman, Bob Storm, heads the list of hopefuls from the "B" and freshmen teams. He stands 6-3 and has a good chance of breaking into the starting lineup although he did not letter.

Terry Schaper, a junior who transferred from Marion this year, Mike Downey, Mark Beaudway, and John Williams are also making a strong bid for the varsity squad.

Coach Barnbrook feels there is much competition for top area honors. He includes Warsaw, Goshen, Riley, Michigan City, Gary, Roosevelt, and Central in the group that should be "real tough" by sectional time.

This year's schedule remains the same as last year's except for two changes. Lafayette Central Catholic has been added to take the place of Hobart, and a South Bend Holiday Tourney will replace the Mishawaka Holiday event.

The South Bend Holiday Tourney will be played on December 20 and 22. The eight city teams will compete for what also must be termed the "City Championship," because all of the city schools will be involved. It should also be a good indication of the February South Bend Sectional outcome, also.

After traveling to St. Joe this Friday, the Eagles will return home to entertain Lafayette on November 23 and Clay on December 2.

## Season Tickets Offer Advantages In Price, Seating and Sectional Seats

Basketball season ticket sales began November 7 with the distribution of order blanks in the homerooms. Students and adults may continue to purchase tickets until the first home game on November 23 with Lafayette Central Catholic.

The season tickets cost \$3.00 and are good for the nine home games.

Orders for tickets should be placed with homeroom representatives. The tickets will be delivered several days later. This method gives every student a chance to purchase a ticket.

Adults may purchase season tickets either through students or through the ticket office. The price of adult season tickets is \$6.00.

There are many advantages to purchasing a season ticket. The best of these is a saving of \$1.50 over regular admission price for students and \$3.00 for adults. A season ticket also eliminates the bother of buying a ticket before each game.

Another advantage is that stu-

dent season ticket holders may sit in the cheering section in the bleachers while all others must sit in the balcony.

Most important of all, season ticket holders will be given first priority in the issuance of sectional tickets next February.

## ARONSON ENTERS TENTH YEAR AS WRESTLING COACH

So far this year everyone has known Mr. Morris Aronson as one of the freshmen football coaches or as an ardent math teacher, but with the coming of the winter sports season, Mr. Aronson takes on a new face and becomes our wrestling coach.

Coach Aronson came to Adams in 1957 and coached the fourth wrestling team in the history of the school.

During this "typical year" Coach Aronson's team not only went undefeated, but they captured the Conference, Sectional, Regional, and finally State titles. This was some typical season, Mr. Aronson. However when asked if he thought the success of last year's team would effect this year's team, Coach Aronson replied that he did not think the success of a previous team would have any affect on this year's team; "another year — another team."

### Lettermen

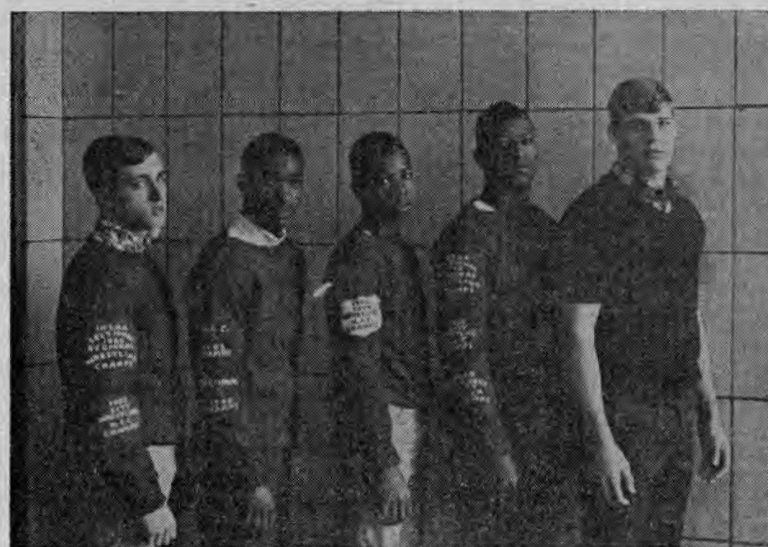
Five returning lettermen will form the nucleus of this year's team. State runner-up and captain of the squad, Horis Russell leads the group. His goal is to win the state title this year.

who scales in at what weight.

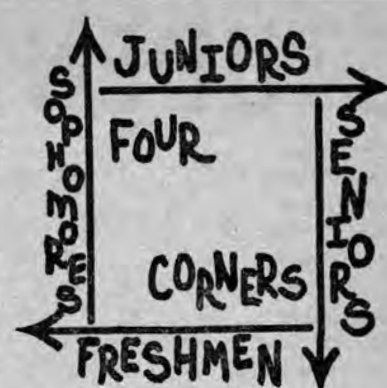
Last year, Coach Aronson predicted "a typical year." His team won the state title, so if "a typical year" results again the Eagle matmen might have another state trophy.

On the day of a meet, each wrestler must weigh within two pounds of his weight class. Each boy is weighed before school begins in the morning and if he is overweight, he must somehow get down to weight before the meet.
