Natalie Holmes is a student here at Adams, but she is anything but an average student. Ever since Natalie was a baby she was different from the rest of us, but it wasn't until she was six years old that the doctors discovered that the condition causing her complications was Mitochondrial Myopathy. Mitochondrial Myopathy a disease in which the mitochondria within your cells do not produce energy correctly. Only two years after being diagnosed with Mitochondrial Myopathy, Natalie had to have her first brain surgery to treat Chiari Malformation, a condition that causes your brain to protrude past the base of your skull. Through this surgery they also found that Natalie has Ehlers Danlos Syndrome (EDS), which is a condition that causes your body to overproduce scar tissue. Due to her EDS, Natalie had to have four other brain surgeries since then, one of which was just this July.

The recent surgery that Natalie had on her brain in July came with some major complications, but she stayed strong and stayed positive saying "my goal, before and throughout my surgery, complications, and inpatient rehab, was to start my junior year of high school at JAHS on the first day of the school year. I got out of inpatient rehab late on the Friday before school started for this school year. And I made it. Barely. But I made it." Because of her strength and power to overcome things such as this, Natalie is being recognized as one of the Riley Hospital's Champions for 2018. Riley hospital only chooses eight people to be recognized out of the seventy nominated, so this choice is a great honor. Along with being honored by Riley Hospital, she was also recognized at the Riley Hope Happens Here Luncheon event

on November 17. Natalie got to speak in front of 1,500 people one of them being John Adams own Mr. Seitz.

However, these recognitions do not come for nothing. Because of her conditions, Natalie has been on a countless number of doctor visits and even more visits to the children's hospital in Indianapolis. Along with these visits, Natalie is fed 24/7 through a tube to help keep her energy levels at a baseline. Because of the Mitochondrial Myopathy, she doesn't have much energy and she is consistently at a baseline that is lower than the average person's. Natalie has taken what was given to her not as something to limit her and her abilities, but as something to push and encourage her to be the best she can be without letting anything get in her way.

NET NEUTRALITY: What We've Lost, and What We Still Don't Know

On December 14, the Federal Communications Commission [FCC] led by Ajit Pai voted 3-2 to repeal Obama-era net neutrality regulations. These regulations prevented internet providers from restricting what information users can see online, reducing the quality of service, and charging for the use of certain websites, among other things. Essentially, it made the internet like any other utility you paid to use it, and that was it.

The repeal will take at least a few weeks to go into effect, but the political effects were felt immediately as public opinion overwhelmingly rejected the decision and a number of organizations and states began to sue. It is unclear why the FCC was so determined to see the decision through when they knew a legal battle would follow, citizens of their own party would reject them, and the world's most prevalent form of communication would become more restricted from the groups that need easy access the most. Even the positive outcomes they cite lack conclusive evidence,

and Pai's ties to Verizon give this decision the same stench that has followed some of Trump's problems with conflicts of interest.

During the vote, the FCC had to evacuate due to security threats, something that news agencies reported through Twitter before it could be found anywhere else, an accidental and poignant argument for net neutrality in and of itself. Sure, some of the people outraged are mostly worried about losing the Instagram aesthetic they've worked so hard on, access to iconic Tweets, and Snapchat streaks that are years long.

Indiana is not one of the states pushing back against the FCC. If you care about the internet as we know it, contact our Congresspeople and do your part to keep it!

> But, aside from making these superficial parts of the internet free, net neutrality ensures free access to news, art, and countless methods of communication.

There is a (faint) light at the end of the tunnel, however, in the form of uncertainties. AT&T, Comcast, and two industry trade groups "promised consumers that their experiences online would not change [if net neutrality is repealed]." If major companies themselves don't raise their prices, competition will force the others to follow suit. Furthermore, Congress can still make new net neutrality legislation, though it looks like this may come too little or too late.

To quote one of Ray Bradbury's comments on his magnum opus, Fahrenheit 451, "There is more than one way to burn a book." When five - or, in reality, three - people decide for the entire nation that information on the internet will no longer have a guarantee of freedom and accessibility, our nation moves closer to censorship, something the American character inherently rejects and fights against time and time again. We as the American people deserve better than to have something as important as free communication taken away from us, and as states and as private citizens, we have the responsibility to demand better.

JERUSALEM

Among the many perennial foreign policy issues facing the United States in a post Cold War world is Palestinian statehood. Palestinians claim that their land was taken unfairly in the 1947 partition that created the modern State of Israel. Israel, on the other hand, points to several thousand years of Jewish history that have been lived out on Israeli/Palestinian soil, citing it as the land of a people long excluded from their home. In the middle of this debate (quite literally) lies Jerusalem. Considered by many to be the seat of Israel/Palestine, it was internationalized in the 1947 agreement, left as neutral ground with no real attachment to either side. Partitioned to give equal parts to Arab and Israeli control, it was fully annexed by Israel in the 1967 Six-Day War. The international community denounced the move as illegal, and a 1980 declaration stated that Jerusalem was the Jewish capital and it emptied the city of any foreign embassies.

That changed December 6th, when President Trump announced the decision to move the American embassy in Israel from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem, recognizing the city as the Israeli capital along the way. Through this move, the United States joins only three other nations in formal recognition of Jerusalem's status as the capital. The choice has also disrupted peace talks between Palestine and Israel, by heightening tensions between the sides, escalating and elongating the conflict.

Among the most well-cited and mainstream resolutions proposed is the two-state solution. The basic premise is as follows: the current territory is split into two states, one Jewish, the other Arab or Muslim. While seemingly simple enough, many problems arise when looking at the nuances. Who should get what territory? What should be done with Israeli settlements in occupied territories? The questions go on. This decision has disrupted the attempts at resolution by giving one side the backing of a major world power, changing negotiations drastically.

For some, however, the two-state solution concedes too much to the opposing side. Take Noor Kanan, for example. She works in Student Management as a student worker. An Arab herself, she feels quite strongly on the subject, especially regarding President Trump's latest move. "I would have been ok with a two-state solution, but not now after this [has] happened," she said. Her sentiments are shared by many Palestinians, who protested the decision at American embassies around the region. They are also partly shared by some Israelis. "I don't support Israel politically," said a sophomore who wished to remain anonymous. He did support a two-state solution, emphasizing that "Israel has a right to exist."

My discussion with these two opposite sides revealed the nuance and complexity of the situation. It also shows how close to home the crisis hits, even thousands of miles away; people you know and interact with may have personal ties to this international dispute.

SENIOR SPOTLIGHT BERNAL CORTES

For roughly four years, Bernal Cortes has been swimming competitively for our John Adams' Varsity team. With his strong work ethic and determination, he has climbed the ranks from the bottom of the roster to the top as a Varsity captain. When asked how different this experience is in comparison to his beginning stance, he replied, "Swimming is such a team sport, although it doesn't seem like it. We train together, suffer together, and race together. Our team is made up of a lot of new guys that are learning to swim [competitively]. My main role is to both serve as a model for good technique and [how to be] a good person. I try to help these guys learn team skills, while also teaching them how to swim. The main difference is that I have 25 other guys looking to me for direction."

As of December 12, the swim team is 2-2 with wins over Marian and St. Joseph High School. Bernal spoke about how the season was progressing, saying that the year is definitely a rebuilding year. He explained "We lost two fast guys last year, but now we have a lot of new guys - which seems very promising for the future." Even though it was described as a year to grow, the wins over the two schools were quite impressive. Adams beat St. Joe 99-78 and Marian 111-68 with the only two losses being closely matched against New Prairie and Bremen.

Lane McDonald is one of Adam's best athletes in both swimming and cross country. Additionally, she's been involved in triathlons since the age of thirteen. She's come a long way since her beginnings, moving from a beginner in the sport to a nationally ranked athlete. "Becoming a nationally ranked athlete in one of the most challenging sports there is and it has shaped my life. I first started racing draft-legal triathlon, the form of the sport that occurs in the Summer Olympics."

Since then, she has steadily climbed the national rankings, most recently finishing eighth at the 2017 USA Triathlon [USAT] Junior Elite National Championship. She said, "For me, getting to this point has not been easy. I have been tested as both an athlete and a person. Triathlon is extremely demanding and it has taken a great deal of time, hard work and dedication to be successful in it." When asked about the benefits of the sport and the ways it has shaped her in spite of the difficult aspects of such a demanding sport, she said, "Triathlon and everything that accompanies it has made me even more independent, personally accountable and as a result, more mature [...] With each [challenge presented by the sport] comes the confirmation that it helps me live more a more fulfilling life."

While this sounds and is extremely demanding, she says that the lifestyle has made her a better, stronger person, so she tries not to view the difficulties as sacrifices. She explains that she's dealt with injury and slow progress in times at certain points, teaching her patience, and difficult sets in swimming, running, and triathlon have all made her more resilient. As far as the mindset it has given her, she explained, "In
